Herbert Abandons Famous case.

Montreal, Nov. 18—Lack of funds to finance his side of the proceedings is given by Eugene Herbert's attorney as the reason which forced him to withdraw yesterday his opposition to the action of his former wife in seeking to have the judgment annulling the marriage set aside. The parties are now in the position as they were prior to the judgment by which their marriage was declared null in the eyes of the civil law. Herbert renounces the rights conferred upon him by that judgment though seeking to maintain his right to take recourse, if at any future time he desires to do so. It is likely, when the case comes up on Monday, judgment will be rendered in default and the civil status of the marriage contracted before Rev. Mr. Timberlake re-established. As a result, though in the eyes of the civil law the woman will be regarded as the legal wife of Mr. Herbert and their child legitimate, in the eyes of the Catholic Church and of her co-religionists she will be held as unmarried.
