## HYDRO CONTRACT IS DULY PASSED

Resolution Adopted at Special Council Meeting on Friday Evening Last

A special meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber Friday evening. His Worship Mayor Macky presiding. There were present Couns. Armstrong, Cool, Patterson, Moore, Savage, Ramsay and Caldwell. Town Solicitor H. A. Carr was also present. The Mayor explained that the meeting had been called to consider the signing of a contract with the Lower St. Lawrence Power Co., for the supplying of electrical energy to the town.

Whereas the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton acting under and by virtue of the following Acts of the Legislature of New Brunswick: viz: 60 Victoria, Chapter 58; 6 Edward VII and a contract passed in 1924 is desirous of entering into a contract with the Matapedia Valley Light and Power Company, a body corporate with its head office at the Town of Rimouski in the Province of Quebec, along with the Lower St. Lawrence Power Company, a body politic duly incorporated by the laws of the Province of Quebec, having its chief place of business in the Town of Rimouski, acting as Intervening Party, for the supply of electric power or energy for lighting, heating and power purposes, according to the said contract, stipulations, covenants and agreements as are set out in the proposed agreement.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Town do enter into an agreement with the said Company whereby, the said Company undertakes as follows: 1. To receive for and deliver to the Town, Eleven Hundred (1100) electrical horse power at a point of inter-provincial boundary near the village of Matapedia, measured at Campbellton, beginning on the First day of October, 1924, or sooner and extending for a period of twenty years; 2. To reserve and deliver to the Town additional power or energy as may be demanded from the expiration of Sixty days notice in writing up to a maximum of Twenty-seven hundred (2700) electrical horse power.

For which the Town agrees to pay for all such power used by it in monthly payments as follows: (a) For the first Eleven Hundred (1100) electrical horse power, Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000.00) fixed price per annum, payable in twelve equal monthly payments. (b) For all power in excess of Eleven Hundred (1100) horse power at the rate of Twenty-five Dollars, (\$25.00) per electrical horse power per annum, subject to conditions, stipulations, covenants and agreements contained in said agreement submitted herewith, which said agreement has been considered by the Town Council of the said Town, section by section and approved and that a copy of this resolution be attached to said agreement, that the Mayor, N. C. McKay, and Town Clerk, John T. Reid, be authorized to sign the said agreement on behalf of the said Town and that the Corporate Seal of the Town be affixed thereto.

This resolution was carried, Coun. Caldwell only voting nay.

On motion of Coun. Patterson the following were authorized to install gasolene tanks on the street adjoining their property, Fong Sinc, Harrison and Jamieson, Chas. Goss and Joseph Duncanson.

After a thorough investigation the Electric Light Committee decided the proposition from the Lower St. Lawrence Power Co. was by far the most economical and recommended the signing of a contract with these people for a period of twenty years with the option of renewing at the expiration of this period if suitable to both parties.

Some Figures After a close check, it was found that the total cost of a transmission line from Matapedia to Campbellton together with a sub-station would be not more than \$60,000. The estimated cost of the new installation the first year would be as follows: 1100 Electrical H. P. Per annum—\$40,000.00

The cost of operating our present plant in 1923 was practically \$60,000 for 500 H. P. installation while for the Hydro installation it will cost say \$60,000 for 1100 H. P., so that it is plain that the town saves twice the capacity for only \$10,000 extra.

It is certain that much more revenue will be derived for lighting purposes in the near future, especially being erected and ready for occupancy this summer and in addition it is understood the Council intend to improve the street lighting, just as soon as Hydro is connected. The town's taxpayers will be glad to hear this as the streets here are very badly (continued on page 12)

## ROAD CONTRACTS ARE AWARDED

Burpee Construction Co. of Devon to Build Highway to Marston, Back Road

The contracts for road and bridge work throughout the province have been awarded. Three miles of construction at Marston, Back Road will be done by the Burpee Construction Co. of Devon their tender being about \$27,000 while the government engineers estimate figured out as approximately \$25,000. These tenders on the work were received from Messrs. in Bellefleur, Quebec. One of these was for \$57,000.

The other tenders for work on the various parts of the province were awarded as follows: No. 47, Lepreau to New River, 6.38 miles, seven tenders—Concrete Builders, Ltd.; Fredericton; No. 48, Musquash to Chatham Harbour, seven tenders—Concrete Builders, Ltd., Fredericton; No. 49, Silver Falls to Braden, awarded to Parker Currie, Fredericton; No. 50, Hampton to Bloomfield, 4.9 miles, six tenders—Concrete Builders, Ltd.; No. 51, Perth, five miles south, three tenders—To Armstrong Bros., Perth, N. B.; No. 52, Doaktown, east 10 miles, four tenders—To Concrete Builders, Ltd., Fredericton.

The seven contracts call for an expenditure of nearly \$200,000. White concrete arch culvert and roadway embankment, City of Fredericton—Contract awarded to Norman Hanson & Sons, Dublin Bridge, price about \$4,000. Baird's Brook, concrete arch culvert and roadway embankment, Parish of Upland—Kings County—Awarded to New Brunswick Contracting and Building Company, St. John; price about \$3,000. Green River, Mouka Bridge, floor system, Parish of Green River, Madawaska County—J. E. and D. E. Conally, Bathurst, price about \$3,500. Cliff bridge, floor system, Parish of Musquash, St. John County—New Brunswick Contracting and Building Company, St. John; price about \$2,500.
