BOND STREET PULPIT.

Dr. Wild discusses on "The True Church" - Who are the members of the Church? - Forms of Church government criticised.

Among the enquiries answered by Dr. Wild last evening was one from Ottawa in reference to the utility of the permanent search for the north pole.

The text was chosen from last Timothy, 4th chapter and 10th verse: "For therefore we both labor and suffer reproach, because we trust in the living God, who is the Saviour of all men, specially of those that believe."

The scriptures and human experience prove that Jesus Christ occupies a close relation to the fabric of this world. Great names have been inscribed in the scroll of fame, but none on equal that of Jesus, the Saviour of men.

Christ is the Saviour of all men, but specially of those that believe. The doctor professes a religion that enabled him to hope that all might be saved.

Any authority assumed by "the church over men's consciences is unauthoritative and is only for the purpose of rendering to humankind the human side of the question in expediency, but don't confound this with divine authority.
