### T. C. P.'s Significant Remarks on the Future of Baseball in the Woodbine-Toronto Meet.

In the initial number of Athletic Life, a new local monthly, published in the interests of Canadian sports, there are some very interesting articles on sports and pastimes. Prof. Galt's Smith discusses learnedly on athletic history. Timmie Hickey tells about the benefits and pleasures of curling. Then there are numerous other well-written articles not to forget the careful and correct history of horse racing in Canada by T.C.P. Mr. Patterson's paper winds up as follows:

At the Woodbine meeting of the Ontario Hockey Club in the last week of May, 1894, the efforts of the promoters of the new regime culminated in a gathering of unprecedented magnitude, and made up of all the best—and no doubt, some of the worst—people, constituting society at large. Notwithstanding a deluge of rain—one-third of a year's total rainfall fell in ten days—the meeting was held in the afternoon of May 20th, and over 10,000 persons were present to witness the contest.
