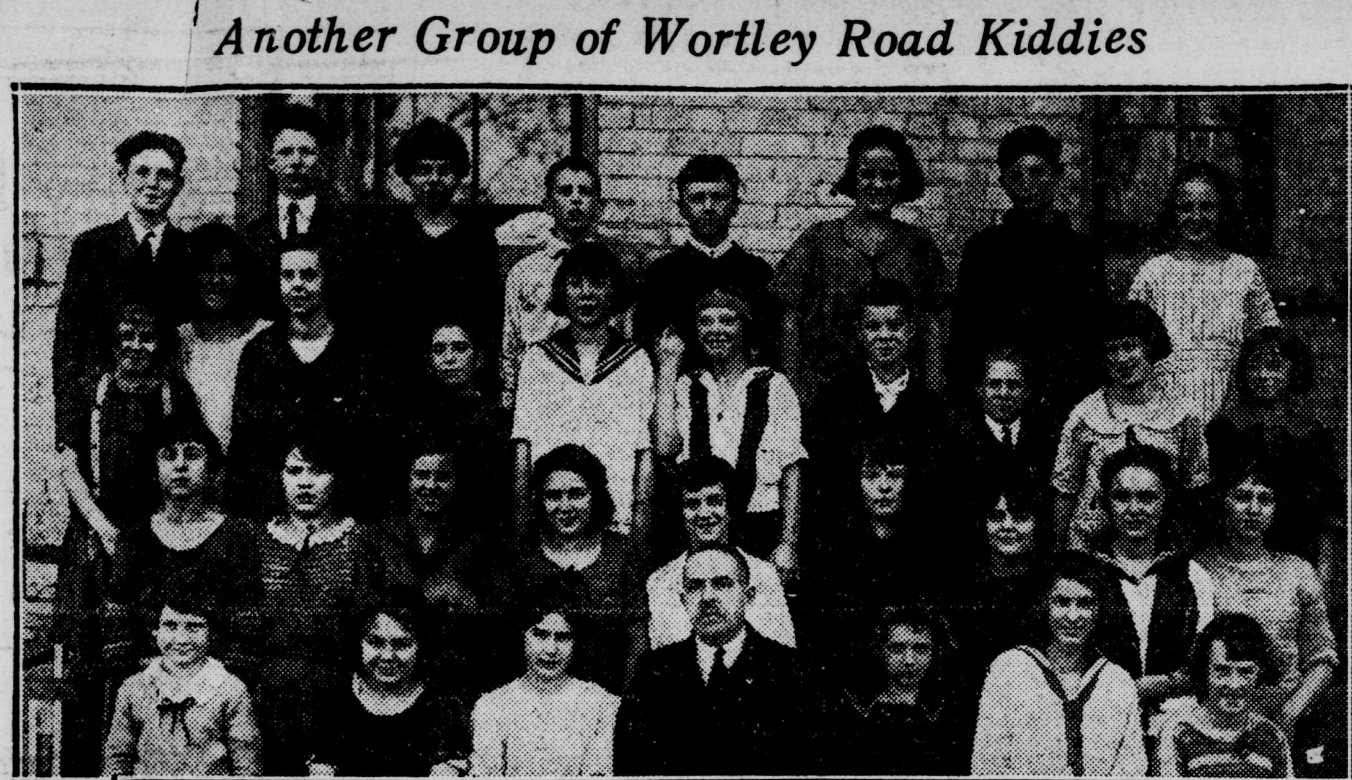
Gay Masqueraders Join Festivities Until Early Morning

MRS. McCALLUM TO
BE RELEASED TO-DAY

Dutton Woman, Acquitted of Causing Death of Child, Is Now Declared to Be Mentally Right.

Mrs. McCallum, of Dutton, who was recently acquitted of a charge of slaying her child two years ago, will be released from the Ontario Hospital here to-day, according to arrangements made between Superintendent Robinson and the attorney-general's department.

Mrs. McCallum, through mental derangement of a temporary nature two years ago, caused the death of her child shortly after birth, and was confined to the Ontario Hospital up to the time of her trial at St. Thomas a week ago, when she was adjudged innocent of murder on the ground of insanity at the time.

As far as records can be found, this is the first time a person has been allowed freedom after such a happening. Officials at the hospital agree that Mrs. McCallum is normal now, although her mind is a complete blank regarding the events leading up to and immediately following the event. She is to report to Dr. Robinson at stated intervals, and the continuance of her freedom depends on her progress and actions between these visits.

EUROPE DIVORCES
NEED AND LIBERTY

Will Rose Tells of Social and Political Trouble in Central Europe

AT S. C. M. MEETING

Claims There Is a Strong Tendency to Separate Life and Religion

That the trouble with social and political conditions in Central Europe to-day is the existence of a state of divorce between the "needs and liberties" of the people, was the keynote of Will. Rose's address to the members of the Students' Christian Movement at the Arts' university building yesterday afternoon.

"There is a strong tendency in the universities of Southeastern Europe," Mr. Rose explained, "towards a clash between life and religion. Saturday and Sunday, body and spirit. Men and women in Central and Southeast Europe today have just come through a fearful crisis. The war and the terrible privations accompanying it have laid bare real issues. Things that were once cracks have become crevices. There is disorganization everywhere. The war has emancipated the people of Central Europe politically and socially, but still they are not free in the true sense of the word. They do not, for instance, fully realize yet their great responsibility connected with suffrage. They have fallen from one sort of despotism into another, from monarchy into the grasp of big interests, represented by men like Stinnes."

TAKEN FOR GRANTED.
"The double standard," he continued, "is not condemned in Southeastern Europe. It is taken for granted. Czechoslovakia and Hungary have told me that at a meal life seemed narrow to them, and they were well cultured, too. They had been brought up with the 'jaundiced eye' scientific methods are now making people reconsider even the inspiration of Scripture."

"The narrow church methods that have oppressed the people for centuries have resulted in a distrust of everything connected with the church. These students say that the only truth is science and nothing but science. Von Lassalle said that he would rather have the privilege of searching for truth than have truth itself. It will be remembered that Plato asked what was truth and had a meal for an answer. This indifference of religion was the natural result of the narrow church oppression for centuries. But this too great opposite tendency must be stopped. There are people who have thought for centuries must be taught to think in a true Christian sense."

ENTER POLITICAL LIFE.
"The students in this Southeastern area of Central Europe will soon take an active part in politics, and if their powers are guided in the right way a general rehabilitation of troubled Europe will take place."

"Love God, and do as you please," is my maxim, concluded the speaker. Go to church, live lives of love, keep decent, then do as you like."

Mr. Rose was a Rhodes scholar at Oxford from the University of Manitoba, from 1905 to 1908. He went to Europe in 1912 to do graduation work. In 1913 he complied with a request to pioneer a Student Christian Movement in Southeastern Europe. His headquarters there were at Prague. Six months before the war he was made a civil prisoner in Silesia, where he acquired the language and his knowledge of Poland. Since then he has been working in Poland with the students there as a student secretary with the American Y. M. C. A. He is now on furlough in America and was loaned by the Y headquarters in New York to help out the S. C. M. in Canada. He expects to leave for Poland again soon after the new year.

LENIENCY SHOWN FOR
GERMAN INDUSTRIALISTS

ESSEN, Nov. 1.—The first intimation of an inclination on the part of French authorities to lift the sentences imposed on certain German industrialists is given in the announcement that Directors Lattin and Heinrich, of the Zollverein mine, had been informed they could return to the occupied area. Herr Lattin had been expelled and Herr Heinrich had been sentenced by default to an imprisonment of five years.

MEN'S ARTS UNIT OF
S.C.M. REORGANIZED

Neal Miller Is Chosen Head of Movement for the Winter Season

At a reorganization meeting of the men's arts unit of the Students' Christian Movement at the arts building of the university yesterday afternoon future plans of the organization were discussed, after an informal talk by E. Clarke, provisional secretary of the S. C. M. in Canada, and giving an outline of its history. The S. C. M. exists, he said, because some people want it. It is the desire on the part of college students to realize the true purpose of life, based on the conviction that in Jesus Christ is to be found the full realization of life.

Religion must be more than a mere pretense to these students, Mr. Clarke continued, and most of the members either share the conviction that the life of Jesus is the perfect life or wish to test the truth of this conviction. The speaker, instanced Japan as an illustration of the great amount of pretense and emptiness in some of their culture to-day. This nation had taken everything modern in the way of civilization from the West in the past 50 years except its religion. This was a cause of its failure, he said, because it had no new spirit in the apparent indifference of the modern church towards heartfelt religion.

The following officers of the unit were elected: President—Neal Miller. Secretary—Mr. Fox. Arts, '25, Representative—H. C. Davis. Prof. Dorland was re-elected honorary president of the organization.

FIRST SNOW IS LATER
THIS YEAR THAN IN 1922

October 31 this year, especially as far as the younger generation were concerned, will be a gala day of the 1923 events for two reasons—one because it was Halloween and the other because there were a few furies of snow which marked the beginning of the season when Mother Earth will creep under her shroud of white to await the time when it is in order for her to appear decked out in a new array of the flowers of spring. But 1923 was backward as far as snow was concerned when compared with 1922 when the residents of London and Western Ontario saw the first fall of snow on October 18.

Further statistics from the weather bureau show that there was a rainfall of 1.55 in October, 1923, while the total in the same month last year was 1.84 inches. Nor did October of this year go to the extreme of heat as did October, 1922. The hottest day during the past month was 74 degrees, while that of the same month last year was 85.

Cold, however, was a different matter and the thermometer went down to 23 degrees during the past 31 days, as compared to 24 degrees for October, 1922.
