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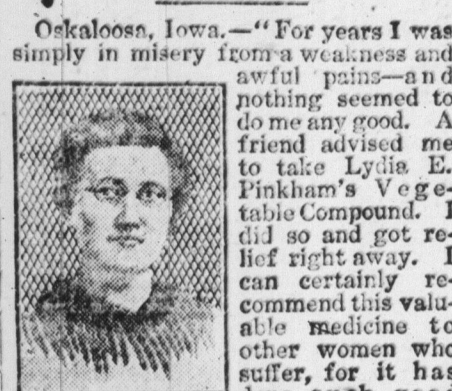

MARINE NEWS

LoBSTERS sold in Boston last week at \$40.00 per crate. The schooner Dorothy M. Smart which hailed in St. John was in Westport on Sunday. The tern schooner Maid of Canada, Capt. John Wilkie, is chartered to load dry fish at St. John's Nfld., for Brazil. The tug Mary H. Cann, left Yarmouth Thursday morning with the new schr. Herbert Eugene in tow for LaHave.

The Yarmouth Trading Co.'s schr. Loren B. Snow, Capt. Lezen Amrauth, got away from Yarmouth Wednesday night on her first halibuting trip. The schooner Morning Star from Gloucester, Captain Ross, reports at Canso the sudden death from heart disease of Lawrence Chevette, one of the crew. Term schr. Stewart T. Salter was launched at Parrsboro on Monday. The vessel registers 225 tons. She is practically all ready for sea and will go to Digby to load lumber for Barbados.

Owing to insufficient water together with the peculiar keel of the schr. Nellie Dixon, the effort on Tuesday to haul her out the marines railway at Yarmouth was unsuccessful and it was found impossible to get the vessel left in tow of the tug Wanda, to go on the blockings at Meteghan. Work on the large schooner building at Little Brook by the I. M. Comeau Shipbuilding Co. is now making good progress. She is now practically sealed and planking will begin within a day or so. When complete this vessel will be about 500 tons and everything is being put in her construction to make her an A 1 vessel of the highest class.

St. John, N. B., March 18: The new barquentine T. H. MacDonald, built at Montevideo, put back Sunday night on account of strong head winds that she met. She came into harbor yesterday and will remain until favorable conditions exist. Her cargo consists of 112,507 feet whitepine, 237,802 spruce and 10 spars. The schr. Maple Field, Capt. Wrightson, which arrived at Havana a few days ago from Halifax, made the passage in thirteen days. This schr. was built by the Theriault Shipbuilding Co., Bellevue's Cove, and in a letter to that concern Capt. Wrightson, who purchased the vessel when she was launched in January, speaks in highest terms of the vessel not only as an excellent sea boat but also a fast sailer.

The schr. Edith Belliveau, Capt. Bay Comeau, which arrived at Barbados last week with lumber from Bellevue's Cove, had a hard passage. Capt. Comeau reports that three days after leaving port the schooner ran into a heavy blow during which she lost a large portion of her deckload. The schooner proved herself, however, to be an excellent sea boat and although heavy weather was experienced throughout the trip she reached port without further mishap. After discharge at Barbados the Edith Belliveau will proceed to Martinique, where she will load rum for France.
