Lynn, Mass.—Following an attack of pneumonia and septic poisoning Dr. William D. Harris, a Lynn practitioner since 1906, died Monday at the Lynn hospital. His home was at 98 South Common street, Lynn. He was a thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Washington Street Baptist church, in which he had been superintendent of the Sunday school, a member of the Massachusetts Medical Society and the Lynn Medical Fraternity.

Dr. Harris was born in Wolfville, N. S., in 1872 and was graduated from Acadia College in 1893, coming to Boston the year later, and attaching himself to the McLean Hospital. Later, he went to Baltimore, where he joined the faculty of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, from which he had graduated. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, three brothers and two sisters.

H. G. Harris, Editor of the Kentville Advertiser and Oscar Harris of Lower Wolfville, are brothers of the deceased.—(Ed. Monitor.)
