REGULATIONS

Respecting the Disposal of Certain Dominion Lands for the Purposes of the Canadian Pacific Rallway.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR.

OTTAWA, July 9th, 1879.

"Public notice is hereby given that the following regulations are promulgated as governing the mode of disposing of the Dominion Lands situate within 116 (one hundred and ten-mites on each side of the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway:

1. "Until further and final survey of the said railway has been made west of the Red River, and for the purposes of these regulations, the line of the said railway shall be assumed to be on the fourth base westerly to the intersection of the said base by the line between ranges 21 and 22 west of the first principal meridian, and thence in a direct line to the confluence of the Shell River with the River Assimiboine.

2. "The country lying on each side of the line of, railway shall be respectively divided into belts, as follows:

O[1] A belt of five miles on either side of the railway, and immediately adjoining the same, to be called belt

A;

"[2] A belt of lifteen miles on either side of the rail-way, adjoining belt A, to be called belt B;

"[3] A belt of twenty miles on either side of the rail-way, adjoining belt B, to be called belt C;

"(4) A beit of twenty inlies on either side of the rati-way, adjoining beit C, to be called beit D; and "(5) A beit of fifty inlies on either side of the ratiway-adjoining belt D, to be called beit E.

3. The Dominion lands in belt A shall be absolutely withdrawn from homestead entry, also from precemption, and shall be held exclusively for sale at six dollars per acre.

3.4. The lands in belt R shall be disposed of as follows: The even-numbered sections within the belt shall be set apart for homesteads and pre-couptions, and the odd-numbered sections shall be regarded as railway lands preport. The homesteads on the even-numbered sections, to the extent of elgibly acres each, shall consist of the easterly halves of the easterly halves of the easterly halves of the easterly halves of the pre-numbered sections, and the pre-emptious on such even-numbered sections, also to the extent of elgibly acres cach, adjoining such elgibly-acre homesteads, shall consist of the westerly halves of the easterly halves of such sections, and shall be sold at the rate of \$2.50 [two dollars and fifty cents] per acre. Ballway lands proper being the odd-numbered sections within the belt, will be held for sale at five dollars per acre.

5. The execution numbered sections in bolt C will be set apart for homestcails and presemptions of 80 acres each, in manner as above described; the price of pre-emptions similarly to be £50 [two dollars and fifty cents] per acre; the railway lands to consist of the odd-numbered sections, and to be dealt with in the same manner as above provided in respect of lands in belt it, except that the price shall be \$5.50 [three dollars and fifty cents] per serve.

6. "The even numbered sections in belt D shall also be set apart for homesteads and pre-emptions of eighty acress each, as provided for in respect of belts B and C, but the price of pre-emptions shall be at the rate of \$2 (two dollars) per acre. Ballway lands to consist, as in the belts B and C, of the odd-numbered sections, and the price thereof to be at the uniform rate of \$2 (two dollars) per acre.

The In the belt E, the description and area of home-stends and pre-emptions, and railway lands respectively, to be as above, and the prices of both pre-emption and railway lands to be at the uniform rate of \$1 (one dollar) per acre.

S. The terms of sale of pre-emptions throughout the several betts, R. C. D and E. shall be as follows, viz.: Four-tenths of the purchase money, together with interest on the latter, at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, to be padd at the end of three years from the date of entry; the remainder to be paid in six equal annual invalinguis from and after the said date, with interest at the rate above mentioned, on such balance of the purchase money as may from time to time remain unpaid, to be paid with each instalment.

3. "The terms of sale of railway lands to be uniformly as follows, viz.: One-tenth in cash at the time of purchase; the balance in time equal annual instalments, with interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum on the balance of purchase money from time to time remaileding unpaid, to be paid with each instalment. All rayments either for per couplions or for railway lands proper, shall be in cash, and not in scrip or bounty warrants.

10 " All entries of lands shall be subject to the follow ing provisions respecting the right of way of the Canadian Pacine Railway or of any Government colonization railway connected the rewith, NIE.

4. In the case of the railway crossing land cutered as a homestead, the right of way thereon shall be fre-to the Government.

e. Where the railway crosses pre-emptions or railway lands proper, the owner shall only be entitled to ciatus too the land required for right of way at the same rate per acre as he may have paid the Government for the same rate.

11. "The above regulations shall come into force on and after the first day of August next, up to which time the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act shall continue to operate over the lands included in the several beits mentioned, excepting as relates to the belts A and B, in both of which, up to the said date, homestends of 169 agrees each, but no other entries will, as at present, be permitted.

12, "Claims to Dominion lands arising from settle-ment, after the date hereof, in territory unsurveyed at the time of such settlement, and which may be embraced within the limits affected by the above policy, or by the extension thereof in the future over additional territory, will be ultimately dealt with in accordance with the terms prescribed above for the lands in the particular belt in which such settlement may be found to be stimated.

13. O All entries after the date hereof of unoccupied lands in the Saskatchewan Agency, will be considered as provisional until the railway line through that part of the territories has been located, after which the same will be finally disposed of in accordance with the above regulations, as the same may apply to the particular belt in which such lands may be found to be situated.

14. The above regulations it will, of course, he understood, will not affect sections 11 and 23, which are public school lands, or sections 8 and 26, Hudson's Bay Company lands.

"Any further information necessary may be obtained on application at the Dominion Lands Office, Ottawa, or from the agent of Dominion Lands, Winnipeg. or from any of the local agents in Manitoba or the Territories, who are in possession of maps showing the limits of the several helfs above referred to, a supply of which maps will, as soon as possible, be placed in the hands of the said agents for general distribution."
