Mr. OLIVER. The books are purchased by the acting director, Dr. Bell, and the committee on the staff of the survey. Of course the books are entirely technical and can only be selected by those who are very familiar with the work.

Surveys—examination of survey returns, printing of plans, including \$13,000 for irrigation surveys, &c., \$500,000.

Mr. OLIVER. The amount asked for the survey of Dominion lands for the fiscal year 1905-6 is \$500,000 which is \$250,000 less than the appropriation for 1904-5. The surveys made during the last two years have been so extensive that they are now well in advance of settlement and it is not considered necessary to continue surveying at

Consolidation of Dominion statutes, which may be paid, notwithstanding anything contained in the Civil Service Act or in the Act respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, \$20,000.

Mr. FITZPATRICK. When this item was up for consideration before, the leader of the opposition asked for some information as to the probable date at which this revision would be completed. I hold in my hand a memorandum of the Deputy Minister of Justice dated 16th of June last, and which reads as follows:

It was anticipated at the last meeting of the Statute Revision Commission, which concluded its last session about a month ago, that the drafting of the remaining legislation up to the end of the session of 1904 would be completed and passed at the next sitting which is expected to take place about the 1st September. The draft of the Criminal Code is, I think, the only matter of any length or difficulty whatever which is not already in print, and Mr. Roscoe has agreed to have that in print and ready for consideration at the next meeting. There will then remain the legislation of this session which will have to be worked in, and the tables to be prepared. The commissioners were of the opinion that if the commissioners go about the
