I do not know where they got any indication that there was going to be any undue haste.

Mr. Pearson: Perhaps they assumed, and this would be a normal assumption, that there might be haste because this government always acts quickly on these matters.

Mr. Starr: That was during the 60 days.

Mr. Pearson: If they have any view that we are going to act with undue haste on this matter, there is no ground for such fears.
