PROVISION OF CHINESE INTERPRETER SERVICE AT VANCOUVER

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT RESEARCH CENTRE

PROVISION FOR ESTABLISHMENT

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs) moved that Bill C-12, to establish the International Development Research Centre of Canada, be read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on External Affairs and National Defence.

He said: Mr. Speaker, this measure is one of the most promising and exciting proposals to come before this House for some time. The bill provides for the establishment of an International Development Research Centre of Canada. This can be a new and dynamic element in Canada's contribution to the global struggle to improve the quality of life in the less privileged areas of the world.

It is now two decades since Canada first entered the field of co-operative international development as a founding member of the Colombo Plan. The recent meeting of the Colombo Plan Council in Victoria demonstrated how greatly our understanding of the com-
