STATEMENT BY MINISTER OF FISHERIES AND FORESTRY RESPECTING WATER QUALITY STANDARDS, CONTROL AGENCIES AND EN-VIRONMENTAL COUNCIL

Mr. G. H. Aiken (Parry Sound-Muskoka): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Fisheries and Forestry. It relates to the speech he made in Langley, British Columbia, on Saturday last, in which he proposed the establishment of national water quality standards, consolidation of pollution control agencies and the establishment, among other things, of a national environmental council. My question is, was the minister expressing government policy when he made his proposals?
