- (a) February 1, 1977

- 2. No general answer can be given to this question since it depends on such factors as directional radiation patterns, frequency of the station, ground conductivity and tower height. Also, because of propagation characteristics after dark, most stations alter their broadcast pattern in the evening, as required under international agreement, to protect the coverage area of other stations.
- 3. (a) The CBC is aware that CBO does not provide an adequate signal in the area of Brockville.
 - (b) Because of the necessity to protect the coverage area of existing stations on the same frequency, CBO could not be designed to cover the Brockville area.
 - (c) CBC has constructed an FM transmitter near Brockville which is expected to go into service as soon as signal interference problems are largely resolved. This transmitter will carry the same programming as CBO.
- 4. Some complaints have been received from people in the Brockville area about lack of reception generally, not specifically about "The World at Eight" and "The World at Six".

CBC—ENGLISH AND FRENCH STATIONS—CONSTITUENCY OF LEEDS-GRENVILLE

Question No. 71-Mr. Cossitt:

- 1. What was the total amount of public funds spent in establishing CBC FM English and French transmitting stations in the Constituency of Leeds-Grenville near Maitland, Ontario?
- 2. Did CBC engineers find that the operation of such stations interfered with radio and television reception by persons in the area and, if so (a) were many complaints received (b) did tests in the past eight months show any improvement in the situation?

- Mr. Peter Stollery (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State and Minister of Communications): I am informed by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation as follows: 1. Five hundred and twelve thousand dollars.
- 2. (a) Approximately 100 complaints were received because a number of weak FM signals (Radio & Television) in the area were affected when the CBC FM transmitters were tested. The transmitters were installed to replace CBC service formerly provided by a local affiliate, to strengthen inadequate AM coverage areas and to provide a basic French language service for the area.

CBC/DOC tests have established that the CBC signals are in conformity with DOC standards and consistent with the provisions of the licence issued by CRTC.

- 3. The stations will go on the air as soon as the signal interference problems are largely resolved. CBC will shortly be making available to area residents technical advice on possible remedies to reduce or eliminate the interference.
