

LATIN PHRASES.

The pronunciation has not been added to the Latin, because every letter is sounded,—*e* final being like *y* in army.

1. A long or short over a vowel denotes both the accented syllable and the quantity of the vowel in English.
2. *Ti*, *ci*, or *si*, before a vowel, sounds *she*.
3. Words of two syllables have the accent on the first.

<i>Alma mater</i> , the university.	<i>Desideratum</i> , something desirable, or much wanted.
<i>Anglice</i> , (äng-gli-cy,) in English.	<i>Dramatis personæ</i> , characters represented.

<i>Argumentum ad hominem</i> , an appeal to the professed principles or practices of the adversary.	<i>Ex cetera</i> , and the rest, contr. &c.
<i>Argumentum ad judicium</i> , an appeal to the common sense of mankind.	<i>Exempli gratia</i> , as for example; contracted, <i>E. G.</i>
<i>Argumentum ad fidem</i> , an appeal to our faith.	<i>Ex officio</i> , officially, by virtue of office.
<i>Argumentum ad populum</i> , an appeal to the people.	<i>Ex parte</i> , on one side.
<i>Argumentum ad passiones</i> , an appeal to the passions.	<i>Ex tempore</i> , without premeditation.
<i>Audi alteram partem</i> , hear both sides.	<i>Fac simile</i> , exact copy or resemblance.
<i>Bona fide</i> , in reality, in good faith.	<i>Fiat</i> , let it be done or made.
<i>Contra</i> , against.	<i>Flagrante bello</i> , during hostilities.
<i>Cacoethes scribendi</i> , an itch for writing.	<i>Gratia</i> , for nothing.
<i>Ceteris (m) paribus</i> , other circumstances being equal.	<i>Hora fugit</i> , the hour or time flies.
