ies shall become industrial armies and naval armaments and dreadnoughts be converted into messengers of commerce and the best strength of our statesmen and rulers be more exclusively devoted to the improvement of domestic conditions and securing the greatest possible amount of contentment and happiness of the people.

Man's New Triumphs.

W. L. Mackenzie King spoke of the far-reaching effects of the peace habit upon industry and commerce. "Only five centuries ago," he said, "it was the boast of the European historian that he could record the conclusion of the 100 years war. Two years from now we Canadians and Americans will witness the consummation of a hundred years' peace. It is the triumph of the men over men, but of men over common enemies of man."

Mr. King mentioned the Rush-Bagot agreement as one of the chief contributing causes for the lasting peace.

"Why not apply the principle to the industrial world," he cried, "and adjust the scales of labor and capital to friendly relations. We had our boundary disputes and our fishery disputes, but every one of them had been settled without bloodshed."

"Prepare for More Peace."

Dr. J. A. Macdonald, famous for his peace propaganda, in a stirring speech declared that 4000 miles of unguarded frontier is America's greatest achievement. He called upon the peoples of the world to forsake the old cry, "In peace prepare for war," and to substitute a new slogan, "In peace prepare for more peace."

SULZER GOT MORE THAN HE REPORTED

Governor's Campaign Fund Was Swelled by Three Thousand Dollars.

ALBANY, N.Y., July 30.—(Can. Press.)—Two canceled cheques, representing \$3,000, contributed toward Gov. Sulzer's campaign fund last fall, but which were not included in the statement of election receipts and expenditures sworn to by the executive committee in the late afternoon, and filed with the evidence before the Frayley Legislative Committee today in its investigation into the governor's campaign contributions and expenses.

One cheque, payable to the order of Louis A. Sarecky, who is credited with handling the governor's campaign fund, was for \$2,500, and was signed "Kuhn, Loeb & Co., New York." Another, for \$500, was signed "Wm. Sulzer." The committee also produced a letter signed "William Sulzer," in which the governor stated that while "congratulations are very pleasant and nice," he was aware that a campaign to be successfully conducted requires something more than words, and added, "I am enclosing my cheque for \$500."

Montreal Employe Charged With Selling Jobs—Other Arrests Likely to Follow.

MONTREAL, July 30.—(Can. Press.)—Petro Ciellil, a foreman employed by the city, was placed under arrest late this afternoon on a warrant technically charging him with obtaining money under false pretences. The arrest is outcome of wholesale charges of graft among city foremen, intimations being made that city laborers were compelled to pay for their jobs.

Ciellil was taken to police headquarters and searched. A bank book showing deposits during the present month of \$1000 was found on him, as well as \$76 in cash. Notwithstanding his protests, he is locked in a cell, where he will be compelled to remain until his arraignment tomorrow.

Other arrests are likely to follow.

The warrant for Ciellil's arrest was issued after a consultation between Controllers Lachapelle, Godfrey and Ainey, Chief Engineer Janin, City Attorney Laurendeau and Chief of Police Campeau.

Hail Along Boundary.

MOOSE JAW, Sask., July 30.—Settlers arriving from the south country today tell of a serious hailstorm along the boundary. It was the worst experienced in many years. Little or no damage was done in Saskatchewan, but many hundreds of acres were devastated in Montana, just south of the boundary.



GALT, Ont., July 30.—(Special.)—The record published today shows one hundred more houses for Galt completed or under way for the first six months of the year. And the permits continue to increase. Still Accept Titanic Claims. NEW YORK, July 30.—Federal Judge Mayer, today gave permission to file additional claims for loss of life, for injuries and loss of baggage, in the proceedings instituted by the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, Limited (White Star Line), as owners of the Titanic, for limitation of liability. Under the order of the admiralty court, all claims were to have been filed by April 13 last, but Judge Mayer in granting the motion stated that as far as he was concerned, he would accept claims in that matter up to the time cases went to trial.
