

Jinx Wyatt Lee Spoils Double Victory Sunday

LEAFS SPLIT UP THE DOUBLE-HEADER WITH NEWARK

Bull Wagner Held Them Safe in First — Wyatt Lee in Form and Home Team Take the Second — May Be Protest.

NEWARK, N.J., June 21.—(Special.)—Joe Kelley's plan to get even for the double defeat of Saturday was thwarted here this afternoon by Manager Harry Smith of the Newark Indians, who trotted out Wyatt Lee in the second game of the double-header after the Leafs had made merry with Al Schacht and copped the first encounter 1 to 0.
