The ceremony was cenducted by has Lordshap the Bishop of Peterborough, accompamed by Very Rov. J. J. AIcCaun, V.G., Very her. W. M. Harris, Fathors Jefficott, Gallagher, Mulcahy and Reddin. His Lordship explamed the nature of the ceremuny about to take place, and the practice of the Church of blessing the temples of God and invokung His protection and favor upon the people who wall henceforth Forship in these temples. His Lordshup pontuficated at Migh Mass whinch нas sung by Father Gallagher of Fickering, assisted by Father Iieddin, deacon, and Cather Mulcahy, sub. deacon. Aftor the Guspel, Very levv. W. R. Harris, Dtan of St. Cathannes, preached the sermon of the day.
Taking as has text the passago from St. Paul's Lipistio to the Ephesians Fherein husbands are cajoined to love their wives as Christ also loved the Church. Father Marris said it would be difficult to imagine any simile that could more adequately indicate the relationship betweon Christ and the Church than this refcrence to that most intimate of all haman relationship, the marr. 1 state. The Scripturo story tells how when Alam was created, God cast him into a doep sleop, arising from which he found a being like unto himself, formed from his own sidc. Afterwards the ordinance had gone forth that a man should leave father and mother and ail others, cleaving to his wife. This was tho culminating act of creation. In the mork of redemption, St. Paul finds in Christ's union with His Church \& corresponding relation. From His side oozed out His sacred blood bless ing all upon whom it desceaded. In ing all upon whom thise was the Ohurch founded.
Tho Catholic Clurch is not to be regarded as an aggregation of men and women bsaded together because of their holding certain opinoons in com mon. It is not a closc corporation. It existo not for any predestined elect. It is for all and embraces all. It has its Judas to betray and its Poter to deny. Yot while its hand is reached out to succor all from the effect of human frailty, it is uncontaminated by wickedness. Sanctity is its inherent principlo of life; sanctity is fonnd everymbero in its operations, in its sacrific, in its sacraments, in its institutions.
When Adam sinned, a change camo upon the Liniverse. Justice at the throne of an ofrended God demanded the destruction of the disobe. dient creaturo. Nieroy interceded in vain. It was then that Jesus Christ, God Himself, said that Ho Fould tako God Himself, said that Ho nould tako
tho form of man who had rohallad,
thas Ho would tako flesin and suffer, that nails should piorce the lesh, and that as man's intellect had robellod, His head should bear the crown of thorns, as man Lad sinnod in all his being, His heart should be pioresed by a lance in atonement. Holocausts and burnt offorings could not satisty the burnt offorings coula not batisly the
justice of God; Ho would doliver Himself up that satisfaction might be complete.
As one instance of the sanctity of tho Church's teaching it would bo well to consider its position concerning this marr!age relation to which St Paul refers. If wo but glance at tho condition in the republic to the south of us wo shall find judges and legis latures, upon the most trifling cousid erations, setting aside the command that no man put asunder suck as God has joined together. "Cntil Death do us part," is the pledge mado by nean and woman in God's sight. But when trial and sickness have deprived the woman of the freshness and besuty of her youth, man is free in the eyes of these legislatures to seek anotler victim and to discard the one anotler victim and to
to whom be is sworn.
The Church protects the woman. It ministers proclaim that the Church of God knows no separation and tell the deserters that hell is opon for such as are foresworn. The Church, as Cbrist left it, found woman the slave of man, a creature for him to play with. She has been raised up. The religion of Christ re grized the equal. ity of hor soul with that of man God is looking down upon the iniquitics now practised against woman, and the Church. His representative lifts up its roice naceasingly for her protection.
Another evidence of the sanctity of the Church consists in its directing spirit. The essential life of the human body is the immortal soul which God alone can destroy. So long as it re mains there is life. So it is with the Church. The Catholic Church is not a mere set of mon. The priests are not the Church; the Bishops are not the Church; the Pope is not the Church; we are ail part of the great body of tho Charch, but the soul of this body is the Eoly Ghost. Christ promised before His ascension that Ho would send the Holy Glost, to teach all trath and to abide by Iis Church forever. Do we realize the effect of this statoment? सas our Blesged Lord lied? If so, farewell to all religion. "Have a care," cried the Jew of oid when they would put Peter and Panl to death. "If this religion is from God, we cannot de stros it ; if it is of man, it will die of itself." He spolse wisely. The Church cannot dis until the Holy Ghost leares it. And we are promised that the Holy Ghost will abide to the end of time.
This then is the principle of holiness. But what of its application? Catiolics beliere that at the consecration a complete change of substanco is offected on the altar, bread and Fine becoming the body and blond of Chrigt. Non. Catholics profess to bo unable to accopt this, which seems to them a prepostorous idea. They are in precisely the same position as those men of 2,000 sears ago who rofused to follow Jesus Ohrist on the same question. When ho said, "Cnless you eat my flesh and drink my blood you shall not have lifo in you," they,

Well meaning, cealuad folluriusy, thought the Muster had gone maid, and they went of anu luft him. But when Christ turned to Putcr, and asked whether he too would go. Le to Whom was delegated the primacy of all who hupt ibu fuith atavinered by a deolaration of ulwavering devotion. This was the same Peter who, long after, when ho stuve aged and grey before tho Moman tyrant, defied all terrors rather than renounce his cruciGed God.

It is bucause no buliusu in the real progence of liod il vur churches that we decorate these sharches as best we can. Protestants sulithimes marvel at the expanditare. but wo say as Sulomon said vi the temple, nothing is too good for Jehovah. We are conscious of the prestace of God in conscious of the preseace of Gou in
every particle of the bread of che commanion, and every Catholic behoves that whosoever appruaches that zommunion unworthaly eats judgunent, that is damnativn to lamself. This could not be if it trere merc bread, mere wine, it is the buing of the Lord. The only marvel in var caso is that we are not regarded tua times worse than we are. If a Cathulic is not a saint it is hes own fault.
The Cathol:c unaterstands the rigor of the preparatuon fur the approach to the Sacrauent of the Lucharist. Uur separated brethret, who are sometumes cold strangu tales of us, should be told that the confessional is no childs play. There a mand lays baro the secrets of has sual, winch no human force could drag from him. He becumes as the subject upun the dissecting table, there ta yu erasiun, no concealment. He will not eat damnation to himself.
Why should not a Catholic be attached to has religions Who can ronder that Cistholics are devoted to the Church ? wonsider just one other evidence of the samcuty of that Church. What else could induce soung, tender, noble minded nomen. who have been reared in an atwosphere of kindness, uften of tase, to eare all therr possessions, abandon all anticipations of happmess, and ior What: To cuol the fetered Lrom and
