Central Association Almost Unanimously Votes to Return to Fold After Several Years' Absence.

The Conservatives of the sixth ward are now solid and undivided, the Central Association, which broke away some years ago from the parent Ward Six Association, and which later ab-sorbed the Independent Conservative Association, having decided to return to the fold.

At a meeting held in Brockton Hall a vote favoring amalgamation with the old Ward Six Conservative Association was passed almost without

Those familiar with the history of the Conservative party in the sixth ward are aware that until recently there were three distinct associations. The Ward Six Association was for "straight line" members, and the Ward Six Central Conservative Association was formed. A few of the younger bloods, led by Ald. McBrien, launched out, and formed a third organization, the Independent Conservatives. With Mr. McBrien's election this party, however, faded into the background, and a coalition was made with the central organization.

A meeting of Ward Six Conservatives will be held Tuesday, when the agreement will be ratified.
