Price of Shoe Leather Drops As Result of Ottawa Order

wa, Aug. 12.—The price of hides for the manufacture of boots les is rapidly falling in Canada, since the government placed an go on export of hides, skins and leather, at the advice of the cost of hing commissioner. The embargo was announced on August 4. By August 6 country hides had fallen five cents a pound and advices received state that the price on hides dropped ten cents and on calf skins twenty cents on the Montreal market vesterday. As a result of recent advance in the price of hides and leather, the boot and shoen muracturers had given warning that the price of footwear would soon rise to extremely high levels, altho it was admitted that the increased cost of leather did not amount to more than \$2.00 per pair of shoes.

"This decline in the price of raw material following the government's action, should, if it continues," says the cost of living commissioner, "obviate the necessity for advancing prices on boots and shoes, and, if continued far enough, should cause an actual decline in these prices."

Washington, Aug. 12.— The traditional decorum of senate procedure was upset today by an unusual demonstration of approval from the galleries following an address by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, chairman of the foreign relations committee, assailing provisions of the league of nations covenant.

For more than a minute the galleries spectators applauded and cheered in spite of senate rules and then when order had been restored, they interrupted a speech by Senator Williams, Democrat, Mississippi, in reply to Mr. Lodge. There were more hisses mingled with cheers when Senator Hiscock seconded Senator Williams' speech. Vice-president Marshall made no attempt to check the first demonstration until it had begun to disout, but later he twice threatened to elear the galleries unless order was preserved.
