In charge have entered into negotiations with the Ontario Society of Artists to keep the walls supplied, and no picture may be removed without consent of the committee. The pictures are mounted on gold matting and bear the usual names—O'Brien, Knowles, Mrs. Hester Reid, G. A. Reid, Sherwood, Atkinson, Verrier, etc., etc. Some of the best work is seen in Mrs. Reid's "Roses," which are lovely in color and design; in Mr. Knowles' "Pool of London," and Mr. O'Brien's landscape. G. A. Reid has some characteristic work, and Mr. Sherwood is represented by four pictures of usual merit.

But what interested me more was what is known as the Arundel collection, which consists of a number of copies of very old paintings; they are mounted on gold matting and are set up in cases in such a manner that they afford ample opportunity for study, and at this fall case alone one might spend hours both interesting and profitable. These chromolithographs were published by the Arundel Society, named after Thomas Howard, Earl of Arundel, who was organized in 1828 for the purpose of copying and publishing the important works of the great masters. Among them are copies of pictures by Giotto, Fra Angelico, Van der Goes, Van Eyck, Raphael and Durer.

In the same room is a very interesting number of engravings, set up in cases in the same way as the Arundel collection, and in these I was told that M. J. G. Moorefield, Del. Val was especially interested. When he honored the galleries with a visit, his guide told me this with a great deal of pardonable pride, and I could not help but notice the famous Pappel albino, a very fine print of courtesy, for when a man of his culture and experience, whose life has been spent in the very art centres of Europe, finds a few cases of replica engravings of interest enough to comment upon them approvingly, then they must be very good indeed. But now I come to think of it, it is not so much the collection which interested the ablegate as the manner in which the old engravings had been cleaned.
