The independence of the bench is of vital importance both to the public and the profesthe bench is of vital importance both to the public and the profession—much more important than the benefit resulting from having an occasional enquiry more satisfactorily conducted. There might be a danger of this independence being jeopardized by the growing practice of taking judges from their proper work to discharge extra duties with extra emolument. 
