The Western Fair Secretaryship.

Mr. Thomas Browne, who resigned
the position of secretary of the West-
ern Fair Board, to accept the Post-
mastership of London, is a man
whose place it is difficult to fill. At
the board meeting yesterday there
were two views and two motions: (1)
that the board proceed to elect a sec-
retary; (2) that the selection be hand-
ed over to the executive committee.
The vote resulted in a tie, and the
chairman gave his casting vote in
favor of the second view. It is un-
usual for a Board of Directors to abdicate
its functions and responsibilities in this
fashion, and attention has been
called to the fact that among those
who voted for handing the business
over to the Executive and taking it
from the Board were four members of
the Executive themselves.

Whatever is finally done, and by
whatever method, it is important that
moderate counsels prevail with a
due recognition of public opinion. The
Western Fair is a great direct and
indirect advantage to London, and
should be the care and pride of all
classes of our citizens.

The Strike Situation Up to Date.

In a word, the Company still con-
tinues obdurate; and the people still
leave the street cars severely alone,
declining to ride, except in the union
busses, on bicycles, or to the races by
suburban trains.

The endeavors of the committee of
the City Council have not as yet ac-
complished much, except to bring out
somewhat more clearly the Company's
autocratic conception of their relation
to organized labor and to the conveni-
ence and opinions of the public.

Miss Lulu, daughter of Mr. Alex.
Lindsay, Glenora, was buried on Tues-

lovely wreath of flowers. The Sunday
school class also, of which she was a
member, marched and carried beautiful
wreaths, and the casket was entirely
covered with flowers, gifts from
friends. The pall-bearers were James
Paterson, Mr. Macdonald, Mr. McAlpine,
M. McEwan, W. Harrison
and Jackson MacLachlan.

THE VENEZUELAN COMMISSION.
The Venezuelan boundary commis-
sion held morning and afternoon ses-
sions yesterday. Sir Richard Webster,
British attorney-general, resumed his
speech in behalf of the case of
Great Britain, continued his historical
review, dealing with the original dis-
cussion of the Dutch on the coast.
The next meeting of the commission
will be held Wednesday, June 23.

MARCHAND WILL WRITE A BOOK.
London, June 23.—The Daily News
prints a dispatch from Paris saying
that an enormous sum was offered to
Major Marchand for the purchase of the
rights to the story of his life. He re-
fused, "as his wants are few."

Major Marchand is writing an account
of his expeditions. The Paris press
has been much interested in the story
of his work with the English and
American forces for an English
version.

GETS A THRONE.
It has been definitely decided that
the young Duke of Albany, grandson
of Queen Victoria, is to succeed to the
throne of the Grand Duchy of Sax-
ony and Gotha, on the abdication
of the Duke of Edinburgh, and the re-
nunciation of the Duke of Connaught.
