## CLEMENCEAU TO **CRUSH REVOLT**

#### French Premier Says the Wine Growers' Must Respect the Law.

Paris, June 18 .- The action of the Government in determining to prosecute the wine-growers in the south of Dutton, who was hurt in the accident on the Pere Marquette on Saturday, is report-France, led to a lively debate in the Chamber of Deputies this morning, but after a tumultuous session, the cabinet secured an indirect vote of confince by the large majority of 254. Premier Clemenceau refused to agree to the immediate discussion of an interpella tion on the subject of the Government's plans, and demanded that the motion be postponed until June 26. In a speech which was frequently interrupted by noisy protests, he declared that all means of conciliation were now exhausted, and that as chief of the Government, he was bound to enforce respect for the law. If the Chamber defeated the postponement of the interpenation, he would immediately countermand the prosecutions and the Chamber would be responsible for the grave consequences. The Government's motion was finally adopted amid wild excitement, by 412 to 158 votes.



St. Petersburg, June 18.-The return of the guard regiments to their summer camp at Krasnoye-Selo indicates that the authorities have definitely ceased to reckon on an outbreak of disorder at the capital following the coup d'etat. This view is confirmed by the action of the revolutionary parties in declaring against armed outbreaks at the present time, when the troops are loyal to the Government. A high police official, however, says that a speedy resumption of the revolutionist campaign, including attempts on the lives of the ministers, and other high officials, may be expected, this as in the days of M. Sipiagine and Von Pleve, being the only means available for striking fear into the hearts of Government officials.
