PATRONAGE SYSTEM FOR CONTROL OF FOOD ABSOLUTELY ROTTEN, SAYS SAM CARTER

ST. THOMAS, July 13 .- "It is imoral to continue the patronage evil at this time. If twelve months ago we could have got a dozen men to declare their position for a national govern-

"Thank God that Mr. Rowell claimed that there should be houses for them, and yet the Government, while letting certain people practically steal millions, gave a paitry \$25,000 to save these children. When we got \$1,500,000 from the mines, we only got part of what we should have had."

Again referring to the defectives of the province, he said that there were 120 feeble-minded persons who had attempted to commit murder in Toronto—"and yet we have been called fire-—"and yet we have been called fire-brands because we objected to the slack-ness of the Government," he added—60 feeble-minded, and all feeble-minded women were potential prostitutes, according to the clinic which investigated these conditions.

Mr. Rowell had said on his return from Europe: "I spoke to the English Government plain, that they should take better care of our boys," said the speaker.

Reading from the report of the Methodist social service department, he advocated a universal minimum living wage, eight-hour day, Government insurance and old age pensions. He also denounced the evils of speculation, referring in scathing terms to "any government that dared to give outright to any class of men hundreds of thousands of trees in the forests," and declared that land, timber limits and minerals should be held for the service of the people. "If we'd have known that the William Davies Company was making \$5,000,000 in bacon last year, there would have been a dickens of a row." he added.

Referring to the recent temperance fight, he said that for 25 years they had made little or no progress, but that the die was cast when Mr. Rowell said, "I will not lead your party unless I can pledge myself to clean up the liquor traffic." He told Mr. Rowell that the ridings were corrupt to the core and that they had written evidence from members that fifty per cent of the ridings were corrupt and had to be bought by money or office. "The party in office has the advantage, because they have all the offices to give away." said

"We pledged ourselves to stop the drink traffic, but there were not ten per cent of the men in the House on either side that had not been elected by money from those behind the traffic." elected by money from those behind the traffic."

Inspectors' Work.

"The large percentage of the Inspectors wink their eyes when they come face to face with the traffic," he added. "We have bad conditions in Gueiph, but we cannot cure it. Men are drunk on the streets every night, and liquor is sold almost openly."

These conditions, he held, were due to the rotten paironage system. He urged the people to be on their guard, and if they saw anything out of the way to communicate with the "Committee of One Hundred" in Toronto, which employed two men, "not for whisky detectives, but to see that those who draw fat salaries do their work."

"Why should we have advertisements urging us to save and produce, when grain and wheat is being wasted in making liquor?" he asked. "Elect men who can talk," he said. "You don't want dumb ones. There are only fitteen or twenty men in the House that talk. Nine-tenths of the men on each side say only what they are told to say. They are told that they won't get the patronage if they talk too much. I don't hear half the Government members. They only come in to vote us down; that's what they do for their salary."
