## DR. HILL MAY QUIT **UNLESS CONDITIONS CHANGE IN LONDON**

Present System of Medical Inspection Inadequate.

### WASTE TIME AND MONEY

Chaos Has Resulted, Says M.O.H., From Recent Methods.

"If the present situation has got to continue, I quit," Dr. H. W. Hill, M.O.H., told the members of the board of health Tuesday afternoon, after he had placed before them a report in which he laid bare what he termed the total failure of the system of medical inspection at present in use.

The situation is so acute and infectious diseases have gained such headway through lack of inspection facilities that drastic reforms are needed, according to Dr. Hill, who advised the appointment of two whole-time medical inspectors and many other changes, including the employment of a public cluding the employment of a public health nurse, an additional sanitary inspector, and the purchase of another automobile.

The costliness, as well as the chaos that has resulted from the present method of having four or five physicians devote part of their time to the work was shown in the report for the past year. Drs. Harris, Dean, Downham, Ferguson and McLean had been devoting part of their time to the work, and even with the combined time of all five, less than a full day's work for one man was obtained.

Serious Delays.

It was sometimes two or three days before it was known whether inspection calls had been made, and many times calls were returned and left over from day to day. On January 7 a total of 60 calls were listed, and during the

Complaints were being received from citizens and school principals because of the delay in releasing people from quarantine, and because the placards were not removed promptly. Confusion also resulted from different doctors calling on the same cases, and through the doctors being unfamiliar with the work.

The department had nobody to investigate alleged infractions of the law by people who delayed reporting their cases, or who came out of quarantine

before they were legally released.

Breaks Down Work.

The failure of the department to give service was leading to neglect in reporting cases, and was breaking down the work of education of years schools and the board.

The doctors who had their own practice to attend had worked hard, but all were quoted to the effect that

the present method was a waste of time and money and a failure.

The need of better inspection was brought to the attention of the board by a delegation from the Simcoe Street Mothers' Club, which, after stating that an epidemic of septic sore throat had resulted in the deaths of four children, urged the appointment of full-time medical inspections, and also the fumigation of the schools.
