Dollar Has Shrunk

Woefully in 5 Years

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—
Comparison of food prices prevailing now with those of five years ago shows that the purchasing power of a dollar bill has shrunk to 54 cents in Washington, 57 cents in Philadelphia, 59 cents in New York and Chicago, and 63 cents in San Francisco, according to a statement today by the department of labor.

Food which could be bought for \$1 in July, 1913, now costs \$1.85 in Washington; \$1.77 in Philadelphia; \$1.68 in New York, \$1.69 in Chicago, and \$1.58 in San Francisco.

If Hindenburg Line Breaks, Condition in the German Lines Will Recall the Spring Break-Up of a Northern River-Next Stage Will Be at German Frontier.

The parallel in modern history is Leipsic. This defeat did not destroy Napoleon's army, but it did compel a retirement of the emperor to the limits of France, and was the prelude to that invasion of French soil which ended in the capture of Paris and the abdication of Napoleon.

If the Germans are not able to pin down the present Allied advance on the Hindenburg at a least, then three thoroughly beaten German armies will have to undertake a long retreat, a retreat to the Belgian frontier under cir-

have to undertake a long retreat, a retreat to the Belgian frontier under circumstances which, even if complete disaster is avoided, will mean the demonstration to all the world and to the German people, first of all that the German military power is broken, and that there is left nothing for the future but the prospect of a wasting defensive, without hope of success, as a result of the presence in Europe of millions of the presence in Europe of millions of American troops.

It would be a mistake to expect the consequences of the present victory to equal those of Leipsic; we have as yet only the possibility, but it is a plain

Moreover, if the Germans are driven from the Hindenburg line the next campaign will begin at the German frontier; will begin by an invasion of Germany through Alsace and Lorraine, just as the campaign of 1814, begun with Bluecher's pass-age of the Rhine, saw its military crisis in the fighting in the Marne Valley, and came to Paris in the

The thing that stands out now is not the recapture of ruined villages or the advance of miles, but the condition to which the German army is being reduced by its inability to get away from the consequences of the defeats of July is and August 8, and reorganize its strategy as well as its shattered divisions.

Advises Canada and Canadians To Take Example From United States.

TORONTO, Aug. 29.—Confidence in he prospect of an early complete defeat of the Germans and natural pride in the calibre of his fellow French-Canadian soldiers from Quebec, serving in France, was ardently expressed at the Canadian National Exhibition the Canadian National Exhibition ncheon this afternoon by Hon. Dr. eland, M. P., former postmaster-gen-Beland, M. P., former postmaster-general, and lately returned from Germany, where he was a prisoner of war for some years.

Dr. Beland was the guest of honor at the luncheon today, and also addressed a mass meeting at the exhibition grounds at 5:30 o'clock' this evening.

At the luncheon the distinguished guest said that the Tenth Reserve Battalion, composed entirely of French-Canadians, compared very favorably as a fighting corps with the Prussian Guard and other German soldiers he had seen in Barlin

and seen in Berlin.

Dr. Beland declared that the malority of the population of Germany
were convinced that they were carryne on a defensive war.


