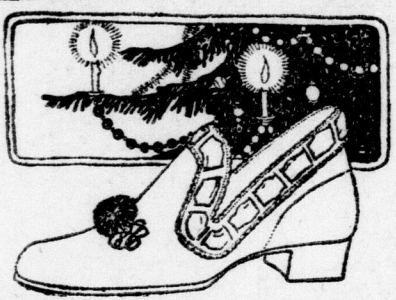

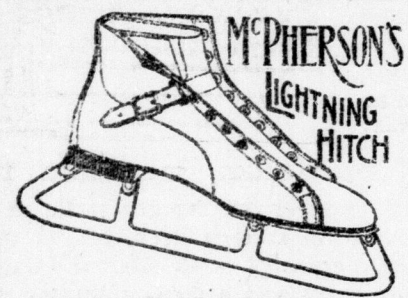

EUROPE INTERESTED IN LONDON DISTRICT; WANTS INFORMATION

Greek Minister in Switzerland Sends for Literature.

From M. A. Michalacos-Poulos, the Greek minister at Val-Mont, Tarrat, Switzerland, comes a request to the London Chamber of Commerce for any copy of the London Bulletin and any other available literature regarding the industrial advantages of London. The request is significant, giving, as it does, some idea of the wide interest which exists in the future of this part of Canada.

The Greek minister's request was forwarded through the office of Agent-General R. Manley Sims, C.M.G., D.S.O., agent-general in the British Isles for Ontario, who in requesting that the desired information be forwarded to M. Michalacos, suggests also that similar literature be sent from time to time to his office in London.

Gordon Philip, managing secretary of the local chamber, has complied with both requests.

STOLE MONEY AND OVERCOAT; TO WAIT WEEK FOR SENTENCE

George Wilson Admits Theft in S. A. Hostel.

George Wilson pleaded guilty in police court this morning to stealing \$30 and an overcoat valued at \$20 from James Woods, a roomer at the Salvation Army Hostel, and was remanded a week.

Wilson still had \$61 when arrested. This will be handed over to the hostel.

Deals With Bylaws Coming Before Voters Soon.

NOTED ENGLISHMEN DEAD.

London, Dec. 17.—The deaths are reported of Admiral Sir Henry Frederick Stephenson, who held the parliamentary office of gentleman usher of the Black Rod; Col. Frank Langbourne, late of the Warwickshire Regiment; Cecil Charles Bloer, deputy chairman of the Lloyd's, and Major-General McNece, a distinguished army surgeon.

CHAIRMAN OF BOARD HAS CRITICISM FOR CITY WATER SUPPLY

Says Commissioners Lax On Surface Water Danger.

YEAR'S WORK SUMMARY

Health Authorities Have Had Busy Time During Twelve Months.

A summary of the board of health's work during the year was presented at its final meeting Tuesday. It shows that thirteen meetings were held. Thirty-one complaints as to sanitary conditions were investigated. Bakeshop regulations were considered, approved and enforced. Five suspicious cases of sink ring were investigated, and on three occasions the offenders were successfully prosecuted. Contagious diseases to the number of 344 were reported, and 2,337 sanitary inspections were made. Four hundred herds of cows and dairies were inspected. Six hundred milk samples were tested. Eighteen sewers were ordered constructed.

Mumps Lead.

During November 162 cases of contagious disease were reported. Mumps had the highest total, 33; diphtheria was next, with 22, while there were 5 suspects as well as whooping cough totalling 23. Of the dreaded smallpox there was only one case reported. There were five cases each of chickenpox and measles. There were five deaths due to contagious diseases. One of these was tuberculosis and the other four diphtheria.

Reviewing the work of the year, Chairman J. H. Saunders said that examinations show that the city's water supply is not quite satisfactory. "The water commissioners do not appear to realize the danger of contamination by admission of surface water," he said. "It must be understood though that the water supply, while perhaps too limited, is generally as pure as can be found."

More Needed.

Referring to drainage, he noted that a West London system has been commenced, and adds that a sewage disposal works in that section of the city cannot long be delayed.

Miss J. W. Ogilvie, provincial inspector, reported on restaurants in the city. She inspected 21 and found the majority of them satisfactory. A peculiar feature was that the three which were reported unsatisfactory belonged to Canadians, while the others are Chinese or Greek.

Inspector James Lutman reported general conditions satisfactory. Two stables were not satisfactory, and one butcher shop, barber shop and one bakery.

SQUEALING WOULD NOT CLEAR YOUTH FOR HAVING LIQUOR

Must Pay \$200 or Go To Jail.

"If I was to turn King's evidence and get the man who sold me whiskey would that clear me?" asked Vincent Foster in police court this morning, after he had been given the option of paying \$200 or spending three months in jail for having a flask of liquor in his possession.

"I'm afraid not," replied Acting Magistrate P. H. Bartlett.

Foster, who had been in the army, but who had not been overseas had been found on Clarence street in an intoxicated condition. He denied having liquor and when the flask was found said that it contained turpentine.

He was caught on Tuesday night. The charge of intoxication was withdrawn.

He had been discharged from the army on November 1, 1918, and in uniform he was wearing it contrary to military regulations, which provide that a man cannot wear the clothes after being discharged a month.

When asked to explain, Foster said that he had ripped his civilian clothes and had to wear the uniform. No charge was preferred against him for this.

WOMAN IMMIGRANT
WANTS EMPLOYMENT
ON ARRIVAL IN CITY

First Application of Kind—Men Needing Work.

That the local Government employment bureau is beginning to note the arrival in London of recent immigrants from the old country, was stated today. Yesterday the first woman immigrant from the old land, who has registered in the women's department of the local bureau immediately on arrival, applied for a situation. The applicant is a native of Scotland, where she had been employed for 12 years in a public laundry, and she desires if possible to secure a similar position here. She was a member of a party of about 70 women immigrants who reached Toronto a few days ago. She had come through to London because some people she knew live here, but in course of a conversation intimated that she liked a bigger town better.

In the men's department there were yesterday three applicants for work by men who have just arrived in Canada from the British Isles. All the men are unskilled. One of the trio was placed in work, but no employment could be found for the other two, a father and son, aged 47 and 17, respectively, who arrived in London on Saturday last.

There have been quite a number of this class of men apply here for work recently, said W. M. Riddick of the labor bureau, a number of them ex-impoverished soldiers. "If these men have been farmhands we could have placed them at work immediately, but at the present time we cannot find employment even for our own unskilled labor."

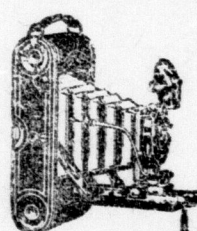

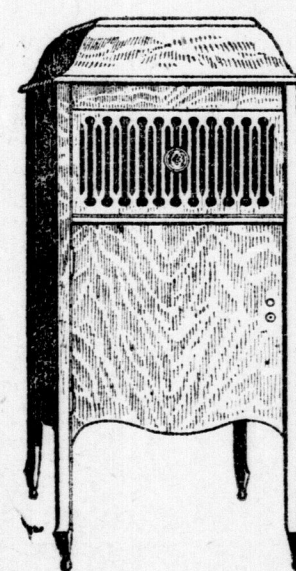

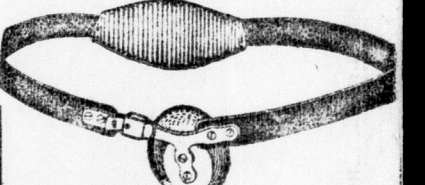

ELEVEN CAPITAL CASES FOR CONSIDERATION BY GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS

Ottawa, Dec. 17.—A record of eleven capital cases is before the Government for consideration. In the eleven, however, are included five charged at Peterboro with one crime. There is to be no interference in the sentence of death passed on Paul Kowalski at Hamilton, Kowalski, while under the

sentence of death, killed two of his guards in an attempt to escape. He is to be executed on Friday. Frederick Walter Fountain, sentenced to death at Welland, was to have been executed today, but the minister of justice ordered a new trial on medical grounds.
