

Three of the National League managers that were fired after the close of the season this year were ex-Pirates, says a Pittsburg paper. Joe Kelley was released by Boston, Patsy Donovan by Brooklyn and John Ganzel by Cincinnati, all three of whom wore the Pirate uniform for long or short periods. Donovan and Kelley both came to Pittsburg in 1892, Donovan on June 24 and Kelley on July 18. Patsy was secured from the Washington Club, the Pittsburg Club trading Harry Raymond for him. Donovan was at once placed in right-field and stayed there till 1990, the year the Colonels went to Pittsburg with Barney Dreyfuss and Fred Clarke, when his services were sold to the St. Louis Club for \$1000. Donovan was twice the manager of the Pittsburg team. He succeeded Connie Mack in 1897 and was at the head of the team for the whole season. In the middle of the season of 1899 he succeeded W. H. Watkins as manager. Donovan was succeeded in right field by Hans Wagner in 1900. Joe Kelley went to Pittsburg from Omaha, the Pittsburg Club purchasing his release for \$500. 
