A strong argument in favor of the restoration of the license was the as-sertion that a number of dives had sprung up in the district since the hotel icense had been cut off.





We pointed out that the peculiar tenure under which land was there held removed largely the interest that the individual had in the government of the place, that where landlordism, in the shape of mining companies, was the prevalent condi-

tion,, a commission was the only way to deal with public health and other things. Such a commission with power to issue debentures based on all the property of the town and township, including the mines, would be able to raise money sufficient to drain the town to give water supply, to provide streets, to secure the ordinary municipal comforts that prevail in Ontario. THE FRENCH ELECTIONS. Nearly forty years have elapsed since the founding of the French republic whose history may be taken as beginning with the election on Feb. 17, 1871, of Thiers as chief executive power with the title of president. The republic has therefore engaged a longer lease of life than any national government since the great revolution, and to all appearance has now thoroly established itself in the confidence of the people. This at least is a fair inference from the first results of the election just held and even more from the nature of the program upon which Premier Briand made his appeal. Its chief feature was electoral reform, and the nature of his proposal shows dis-






