NINE ROYALLY BRED RACE HORSES ARRIVE FOR THE SEAGRAM STABLES

Edmund Haines Reports the
Lot as Having Made Good
Voyage—They Are Win-
ners on the Turf in England
and Ireland.

New York, Jan. 4.—Edmund Haines ar-
rived here yesterday on the steamship
Menominee, with the following horses, all
in good condition, for the Seagram stable.
The lot are the best ever brought to Can-
ada from England:

Parisian Diamond, ch., 3 in 1920, by
Louvola, dam Gem Gem, by Best Man,
out of Queen's Birthday.

Brilliant Jester, br., 3 in 1920, by
Black Jester, his dam Lady Brilliant, by
Andridge; bred by Mr. J. B. Joel.

Wakenfield, b. or br., by Oliver Gold-

smith, dam Huma, by John o' Gaunt.

Mode, ch., 3 in 1920, by Lemberg, win-
ner of the Derby, dam Mira II, by Shang-

win; bred by Mr. Montcheff.

Unrushed chestnut horse by Oliver

Goldsmith, dam Sphera of Influence.

Collar, two-year-old in 1920; bred by Sir

William Cook.

Lady Meave, ch., three years old in

1920, by Ulster King, her dam Mala, by

Wildowler; bred by Lady Conyngham.

Kentish Boy, b. by Poor Boy; his dam

Carina, by Chaucer; bred by Mr. Rus-

sell; was foaled in 1918.

Derision, b.m., by Cock Sura, dam Oh

Flie, by Friary, covered by Ocean Blue,

Mr. H. Trimmer; foaled in 1914.

Isadora, by Imp. Myram, dam Isobarna,

by Isahar; covered by Cockatoo, own

brother to Pretty Polly, winner of races

and a getter of races; will foal March 10.

All were winners in England or Ire-

land during the past season with the ex-

ception of the two brood mares.

Archale, a noted stallion, who finished

second in the last English Derby, has

arrived on the steamship Menominee, and

will be taken to John Sanford's Hurri-

cania stud at Amsterdam, N.Y. Horse-

men who gathered at the pier declared

the stallion is one of the handsomest

theorists ever brought to the United

States. He stands 15.1 hands, and is of

rich chestnut color, with a star and

A large consignment of yearlings and

mares purchased abroad by United States

NEW YORK STATE BOXING RULES.

New York, Jan. 4.—A \$15 maximum

admission for championship boxing con-

tests in New York State and \$10 for

ordinary bouts was ordered today by the

state boxing commission. Exception is

made only in the cases of bouts for

championship purses. The committee

notified clubs to arrange no bouts in the fu-

ture at higher rates.

Declaring that the high prices of

tickets "have been caused, in a large

measure, by the exorbitant demands of

certain boxers who care little about the

public upon whom they depend for their

rewards," the commission said, "the time

has come when this selfish and short-

sighted attitude must be corrected."

Also boxing enthusiasts appear willing

to pay double the prescribed rates to see

boxers of high calibre, it was added, the

commission believes "it is a hardship up-

on the man of moderate means who is

just as much entitled to see champions

in action as his wealthier neighbor."

The first annual report of the boxing

commission and the license committee

will be made to the legislature in a few

days.
