INVESTIGATION INTO FENDERS

Will Be Feature of Coroner's Inquest in Latest Accident.

"This inquest," said Coroner Powell yesterday, in commencing an enquiry into the killing of Kathleen Cockburn, "will take the nature of a full investigation into the mechanical efficiency of the fender at present in use."

The evidence will be taken on Wednesday next, and City Architect Robert McCullum, who was government engineer when the present car fender was sanctioned, and a number of street railway, government and expert officials will be called.

The works committee of the council decided to have legal talent at the inquest. Aid Sheppard said the city should have an official, whose only duty would be to look after fenders. Mayor Urquhart said that if the evidence justified it, he would institute proceedings against individuals, not the Toronto Railway Company, indicating that the directors were referred to.

Dies Crossing Trestle.

New York, Sept. 2.—The body of William C. Jones, a well-known telegrapher and newspaper man, was found last night in Jamaica Bay, where he was crossing a trestle, he was struck by a car. For several years Mr. Jones was Western Union manager at Philadelphia, later coming to this city, where he was day manager of the United Press, afterwards filling an editorial position with the Associated Press.

Stock is Sold.

It is announced that the stock of Powell & Co., general stockholders of the city, has been sold at 25 cents on the dollar to W. C. Crawford of Toronto. At a meeting of the creditors assets of \$15,742.93 were exhibited, with liabilities of \$20,400.87, made up of liabilities preferred \$654.22, secured \$700.99 and unsecured \$12,686.62.

Glens Falls, N. Y., Sept. 2.—Leon Benway, Arthur San Souci and John H. Case broke jail at Lake George last night. The men dug their way through a brick wall with a table knife, being screened by the other prisoners in the corridor.

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TORONTO LABOR COUNCIL CENSURES CITY MEMBERS

Unanimous Action Approving Maclean Resolutions in House of Commons.

The Toronto District Labor Council at its meeting on Thursday night strongly condemned the action of the Toronto members of the Dominion parliament in refusing support to the resolutions of W. F. Maclean, M.P., in the Dominion house in favor of the two-state, competitive telephone in railway stations, and the placing of express companies under the jurisdiction of the railway commission.

The legislative committee presented its report to the council, stating that it was asked to consider the action of the Toronto M.P.'s in failing to support Mr. Maclean's threefold proposal in the Dominion parliament, asking for a reduction in railway fares; also to consider the gross monopoly whereby the Bell Telephone Company is the only telephone company that is allowed to mine connections and do business in the railway stations in Canada; also asking that all express companies, and the charges be placed under the jurisdiction of the railway commission the same as the railway company.

The report dealt with several other matters, but upon the three paragraphs dealing with the Maclean resolutions the council was unanimous.

On this matter the report says: "As regards the action of the members of the Dominion parliament, the committee believes that this council looks upon GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP as ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT OF MODERN REFORMS IN THE INTEREST OF LABOR, AND THAT THE ACTION OF MR. MACLEAN IN SEEKING TO STRENGTHEN GOVERNMENT CONTROL OF CORPORATIONS OPERATING PUBLIC UTILITIES, WAS A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION."

The council also expressed deep regret that they failed to give their hearty support to the three resolutions introduced by W. F. Maclean, member for East York.

In these words President Donnelly of the National Union to-day declared a boycott against all meat, and announced that union men will quit all packing establishments to-day, regardless of where live stock is secured.
