'BOB' DUNBAR, OF ST. PAUL, INTERNATIONAL CHAMPION



The world's championship in the fascinating Scotch game of curling was won from Canada a year ago, and is held by 'Bob' Dunbar of Saint Paul, who brought the coveted prize to the American side of the line after twenty years of continuous competitions, in which for nineteen consecutive years the Americans

were forced to yield to their Canadian competitors. The Dunbar rink which won the trophy a year ago also made clean sweep of the open championship and other valued prizes. The International was won in a contest in which 12 players participated in all. Dunbar is Scotch to the backbone, and has been all his life an expert curler. He is one of the oldest members of the

Capital City Curling Club of Saint Paul, which is one of the oldest curling associations in America, and in his time has trained many men who have since won prominence. Dunbar will play in the coming bonspiel of the Northwestern Curling Association, which will be held in Saint Paul under the auspices of the Nushka and Capital City clubs, January 13.

E. A. Goodwin Questions Col. Swayne's Statement Before Ottawa Canadian Club.

The statement of Col Swayne, governor of British Honduras, before the Canadian Club in Ottawa on Saturday, and published in yesterday's Telegraph, that he could land bananas in St. John for thirty cents a bunch, was questioned by E. If the bananas were put on board the ship at British Honduras absolutely free of cost and sold in St. John, it would, in his opinion, be a losing venture. All the bananas imported to St. John, he said, were imported by way of Boston. The United Fruit Company, an American organization, brought them to that port on fast steamers with special facilities.
