Rev. B. Scott laboured 2 weeks in the service of the Board at Walton, during which time a Bazaar was held to aid in finishing the meeting house in course of erection. He regards Walton as the "rallying point of a growing Missionary field;" and recommends the establishment of a permanent Mission Station there, holding out a very strong probability, that in a short time it would be self-sustaining.

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Rev. James Spencer of Granville spent 4 weeks last Autumn at Falmouth and Chester Road. The people gave him a warmhearted reception and listened with marked attention to the "story of the Cross." He writes :— "On Chester Road I found the cause of religion somewhat depressed. During the past year they had lacked an under shepherd to break unto them the bread of life, and the disciples had become faint and weary. But He who sent out his disciples whither he himself would come, condescended to be with us to refresh and comfort." Preached 28 sermons; visited 36 families; attended 2 conferences and baptized 2 persons.

Rev. William Burton, of Hantsport, by appointment of August 1, 1859, laboured 7 weeks in Newport and vicinity. His labours were greatly blessed. He preached 33 sermons; attended 6 church meetings; made 67 family visits and attended several special prayer and enquiry meetings. During the winter and spring 61 persons were baptized. Brethren George Dimock, D. G. Shaw and Hibbert Longelle laboured with him in the good work.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY.

Rev. Nelson Baker spent 12 weeks in the service of the Board at Parrsboro and vicinity. He baptized 6 persons and organized a Sabbath School. He speaks of the field as one loudly calling for Missionary labour.

Rev. Thomas Keillor was pledged the sum of \$48 August 1, 1859, as remuneration for labour in Parrsboro and vicinity. He baptized 4 persons and "the prospect," he says, "is still encouraging."

COLCHESTER COUNTY.
