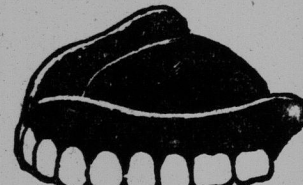

"Pop" Small continues to make good. In Friday's game Montreal defeated Bridgeport 5 to 2. Small went 4 times at the bat with a total of 2 runs, 1 hit, 1 put out, and no errors. Needham the star stop of the Montreal team had 4 of the 10 hits made and had also 2 runs.

The Springfield command by Captain McAlary left her wharf this morning at 11.30 and will go as far as Belyea's wharf and return this afternoon. James Ross went as mate. It is expected she will have quite a few passengers on her return trip.

With the dawn of spring comes the demand for maple sugar and green things for the table. It was learned today that the demand for maple sugar and syrup is considerably in excess of the supply. Sugar brings from 16 to 18 cents a pound, and syrup about \$1 a gallon. In table delicacies the following figures prevail to-day: Spinach, 40c. a peck; cucumbers, 20c. each; American strawberries, 40c. a box; fine native cauliflower, 25 to 50c. a head; native rhubarb, 10c. a bunch; radishes, 8c. a dozen bunches, and lettuce 60c. a dozen.

NEARING THE END

S. S. Montreal Will Be Last Boat to Sail from St. John This Season.

Signs that the winterport business is drawing to a close, are not lacking. This morning the Donaldson line shed at Sand Point (No. 4) was being cleared out in the gear loaded in cars for transportation to Montreal, where the next sailings of this line will be made. Only two more steamers the C. P. R. line are to arrive, the Empress of Britain which is expected the latter part of this week from Liverpool and the Montreal, due April 30, from London and Antwerp. The departure of the Montreal on May 8 will see the close of the winterport sailings for this season.

THEY SANG THE SONGS

OF HOME SWEET HOME Immigrants from the Old Land Joined in "Auld Lang Syne" and Other Cherished Airs.

(Montreal Transcript) It was one of the many contingents of immigrants seeking their Eldorado in the western world, for it has become a common enough sight to Montonians, these trainloads of sturdy Britons, with the bloom of the face of the old land in their faces, joined hands and sang that tender heart song, "Auld Lang Syne," there were many a pair of eyes that were moistened by the sight of the old land, and the heart of the heart to think that they were indeed far from the place and the people that they had left behind.

The Girl That I'm Thinking of, Thinking of Me," they sang, and it was easy to see the last and binding touch of kinship, the kinship that comes of a loyalty to that flag that floats alike o'er English mead and western prairie, and stands for all that is noble and good among the nations. We were glad that we were kinsmen all, and could feel the exquisite patriotism of these glorious words, "Britons never will be slaves."

CHEAPER SCHOOL BOOKS

(Toronto News) The Department of Education of Ontario, it is likely, will announce its intention of immediately advertising for tenders for the supply of Public School Readers for a stated time, probably five years. Canadian publishers will alone be considered, and if the prices quoted by the tenders approximate the estimates a contract will be awarded.

The standard material and character of the books will be materially raised, and the subject matter will be determined by a special consulting body which will likely include representation from the Advisory Council as well as prominent outside educationalists. Notwithstanding the improved character of the books, The News understands the figures before the Department warrant them in anticipating a reduction of some 40 to 50 per cent in the present prices.

The question of the distribution of books by the Government will probably be left temporarily in abeyance, nor will the matter of free school books to rural schools be dealt with at present.

LIBERAL PRIMARIES TO BE HELD TONIGHT

Where the Electors in the Various Wards Will Assemble.

The Liberal electors in the various wards in the city will meet this evening to elect delegates to the convention which will be held Friday, at which a candidate to represent the city and county of St. John in the Canadian parliament will be chosen.

Electors in Kings, Queens, Dukes, Sydney and Dalhousie wards will meet in Berryman's Hall; those in Wellington and Prince wards in the Opera House block, entering by the main entrance in Union street; those in Victoria ward will assemble either at McLean & Holt's or the Victoria rooms, as may be announced in the afternoon papers; electors in Guys and Brooks wards will meet in O'Connell's Hall, Carleton, and those in Lerne, Lane and St. Mary's wards in the Union Hall, North End. The meetings will open at 8 p. m.

Dr. Lemieux spoke of the alarming increase of intemperance in Canada. Last year alone six million gallons of alcohol were produced in Canada—one gallon for each inhabitant. Adding to this the beer, wine and spirituous liquors imported, one could not help entertaining a fear that Canadians were rapidly advancing in the work of poisoning the nation. With the increase of alcohol consumed comes increase of vagrants, criminals, insane and sick persons. Official reports of prisons for 1905 show that in a total of 6,845 prisoners, 2,408 were sentenced for drunkenness in one year.

The doctor advocated the principle of the Central Public House Trust Association, referring to the good result of its operation in England. He insisted on commencing temperance education in the school house, advocated a broadcast distribution of temperance literature, appointment of a commission to study the Central Public House Trust Association system, closing of bar-rooms at 7 o'clock on Saturdays.

INTEMPERANCE IS INCREASING

Speakers at Anti-Alcohol Meeting in Montreal Deplore Increase of Intemperance in Canada.

Among the speakers at an anti-alcohol meeting under the auspices of the Le-mieux Club in Montreal last week the speakers included Dr. L. J. Lemieux, M. L. A. for Gaspé; the Hon. W. A. Weir, Minister of Public Works; Dr. R. L. Laurier, M. P. for L'Assomption; Dr. Godfrey Langlois, M. L. A. for St. Louis; Dr. La-combe, M. L. A. for St. Mary's division; Dr. Desautels, and Messrs. Y. Gaudet, T. Marcell and A. David.

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Dr. Lemieux referred to the dangers offered by patent medicines, having alcohol as their basis, which now flood Canada. He also spoke eloquently of the grand temperance mandement of Archbishop Bruchési. The clergy in his own country had done good work in a population of 12,000 in the Gaspeian peninsula there is only one hotel license, and there were only two arrests for drunkenness in one year.
