### HENRY FORD ANSWERS \$1,000,000 LIBEL SUIT

Insists That "The Battle Cry of Peace" Did Not Represent True Condition of the Country

Henry Ford filed his answer on Monday to the \$1,000,000 suit for alleged libel brought against him in the Federal District Court by the Vitagraph Company of America. The suit is based on the allegation that on May 5, 1916, Mr. Ford caused to be published in 250 newspapers an article entitled "Humanity and Sanity," in which it was charged that the agitation for preparedness was due to the efforts of munition manufacturers, who were merely seeking profit. In the same article the statement was made that a picture play called "The Battle Cry of Peace," produced by the plaintiff, was inspired by Hudson Maxim and others interested with him in the manufacture and sale of munitions.

Mr. Ford said in his answer that the subject of the published article had been discussed in Congress and published broadcast throughout the country, and that, according to these discussions, the proposition for extravagant preparedness had the support of Hudson Maxim and other munition manufacturers. Then he called attention to the book "Defenseless America," written by Mr. Maxim. The picture play, "The Battle Cry of Peace," he said, was based upon the statements made in Mr. Maxim's book, and the book and the play, according to Mr. Ford, served to advertise each other. In describing the picture play, Mr. Ford said it did not represent the truth as to the situation of the country at that time, and was presented at a time when the country had not been, and was not threatened with an attack or war from any quarter.

Mr. Ford said that he considered it his duty as a citizen to publish the article referred to, that he believed the statements made in his article were true, and that he had acted without malice or ill-will toward any one. For these reasons he asks the court to dismiss the suit.

### NEW CENSORSHIP PLAN.

Washington, July 12.—A new censorship plan has been adopted by the government and a widespread extension of it is under consideration. In effect it provides for the strictest possible scrutiny of all outgoing cable messages and a virtual lifting of the censorship of incoming press cable despatches. The outgoing censorship will apply more particularly to commercial messages. The new censorship plan is the outgrowth of the criticism that has been leveled at the various branches of the government which have had to do with supervision over press and commercial telegraphic despatches.

One criticism that appealed particularly to officials concerned was that persons in this country were permitted to send to Europe messages that might contain information of benefit to the enemy. In this connection it was learned that the government discovered that information evidently intended for the German government was being sent by cable from the United States to newspapers in neutral countries under the guise of news for publication. This has been stopped.

One of the arrests made in New York last week was the result of a close examination of a considerable number of innocent-looking cablegrams filed in New York for transmission to a neutral European country. Hereafter, in accordance with the part of the plan already adopted, a follow-up system will be utilized to ascertain if messages filed for mailing contain genuine information or carefully concealed items of military importance to the German government.

There has been an extensive communication of information to Germany from the United States by way of Mexico, and the South American telegraphic cable running from Tehuantepec, Mexico, to the coast of Ecuador has been employed by German agents to get their news to Berlin. A censorship of telegrams going from the United States into Mexico had been established with officers and enlisted men of the United States army signal corps in charge, but their scrutiny did not extend to letters for Mexican addresses containing information to be telegraphed to Germany by way of Tehuantepec.
