## RECEIVER FOR HAMMERSTEIN

Impressario Ill and Design is to Protect His Various Enterprises

New York, April 3.—A receiver for Oscar Hammerstein has been appointed by the United States District Court here. The action resulted from an equity suit brought by the American Seating Company, described as creditor, and a car-bundle on his left foot.  
Mr. Hammerstein's liabilities are approximately \$100,000, and his assets more than five times that amount, according to a statement issued by his attorney. The statement recites that because of Mr. Hammerstein's inability, through illness, to attend to his affairs, it was thought advisable to have a "conservator appointed."  
"This is not an insolvency proceeding," reads the statement. "Mr. Hammerstein is not a bankrupt. It is a proceeding against one amply solvent to protect his various enterprises from being sacrificed."
