
THE policy of the Government is not to encourage immigration from Southern Europe. But the immigration into Canada for the year ending March, 1910—other than from British and American sources—was 41,065, or about one-fifth of the total immigration. The pictures represent the countries sending the largest contingents. Persides these, 1,727 came from France, 1,533 from Germany, 1,457 from Finland, and 1,407 were Poles, IMMIGRATION

tering Canada was 2,156. The destination of these immigrants varies. The Austro-Hungarians distribute themselves fairly evenly throughout. Canada, about 55 per cent. being west of the Graat Lakes. The Russians, many of them Russian Jews, settle principally in the large cities of the East, less than one-third—or only 2,725—locating in the West. The Poles have a similar preference. The Italians, like the Russians, select the East, where heavy labor is more abundant, and only about one-sixth were bound for the Last West. Two-thirds of Scandinavian arrivals located in the West. An interesting fact about the immigrants from France is that 1,024 went to English-speaking Provinces, and only 703 to the Province of Quebec. Nearly two-thirds of the Germans settled in the West.
