

WOOD ALCOHOL DEATH CAUSE, SAYS CORONER

Geo. Creighton of Ontario Dies, Second Man in Hospital

NORWEGIAN IN SERIOUS STATE

Found Suffering in Seamen's Institute; Drinking of Rubbing Alcohol

As a sequence to the death of George Creighton, who died in the General Public Hospital yesterday as a result of drinking rubbing alcohol, Holte Anderson, 28 years of age, and said to be a native of Norway, was taken to the hospital today and was reported to be in serious condition, with symptoms similar to those Creighton had.

NOT KNOWN AT FIRST

When Anderson had first complained to Mr. Miller that he was ill, it was not known that he had been in company with Creighton. Later investigation of the case indicated that Anderson was partially blind, and had been drinking, necessitating the second call for the doctor.

FOUND IN FERRY HOUSE

Creighton was found in serious condition in the ferry toll house yesterday afternoon, following his removal to the hospital. He is a son of William J. Creighton, of Owen Sound, Ont., who has requested the hospital authorities to ship the body to that place.

In old times the Nashwaak was one of the best salmon streams of the tributaries of the Saint John.


