

## DISSOLUTION OF OWNERS' MAIN BODY REPORTED

Move Would Tend To Increase Bitterness, is Opinion.

### MINERS BALLOT

Railways Convert Engines Into Oil Burners With New Fuel Talked Of.

LONDON, June 7.—There is every indication of decisive developments in the coal dispute during the coming week. Both the owners and the miners are urgently seeking a way to gain a victory if possible, or, if not, to reach a reasonable settlement.

The owners are now discussing a plan for the dissolution of the mining association which has hitherto conducted negotiations for national agreements with the miners' federation.

### MINERS OPPOSE THIS

This if accomplished, will compel the miners to negotiate with the individual owners or with the district associations instead of with an association representing the whole British industry, which is something the miners emphatically do not want to do. The movement is being led by the mine owners in the three exporting districts of Durham, Northumberland and South Wales, and is being used more as a threat than anything else in the endeavor to bring back the coal and other mining leaders to a more reasonable frame of mind.

The general opinion, however, is that such a move by the owners would be most unfortunate and would create an element of bitterness in the struggle which would make the outlook desperate.

The government will not regard with favor any such development although they will probably be unable to stop it.

LET MEN DECIDE.

Secretary Cook says today that he is prepared to take a ballot of the miners and their wives to decide what their future action will be. Meanwhile the state of the mining district is perilous and the prospects for the future are declining rapidly.

The Southern Railway and the London Midland and Scottish Railway, the largest transportation agencies in Great Britain are busy converting locomotives into oil burners which will be ready to run shortly.

### NEW MOTOR FUEL

News from Berlin today says that the German Dye Trust is planning to market a synthetic motor fuel to be known as motorin which is expected to become a serious competitor of gasoline.

This is merely one feature of a great campaign in which the inventive genius of German chemists is being devoted to the problem of effecting oil from coal on a large scale. By means of this, Germany expects to become an oil-exporting place of an oil-importing country.

The British mining industry is being urged to get to work and find out how British coal can be converted into oil so as to change the entire character of the industry and place it on a basis to meet competitive world competition.

### RIOTS IN POLAND

State of Emergency is Proclaimed in Tarnow and Lemberg

DANZIG, June 7.—The Polish government has proclaimed a state of emergency in Tarnow and Lemberg following the activity of autonomists in these areas, reports from East Galicia said.

Military forces intervened to halt demonstrations in Tarnopol, in which several persons were killed and 50 wounded, and 105 students were arrested.

It is reported that 3,000 Ukrainians attempted to attack the prison in Lemberg.

### REICHSBANK RATE DROPS

BERLIN, June 7.—The Reichsbank discount rate was reduced today to 6.12 per cent. and the deposit rate to 7.12 per cent.

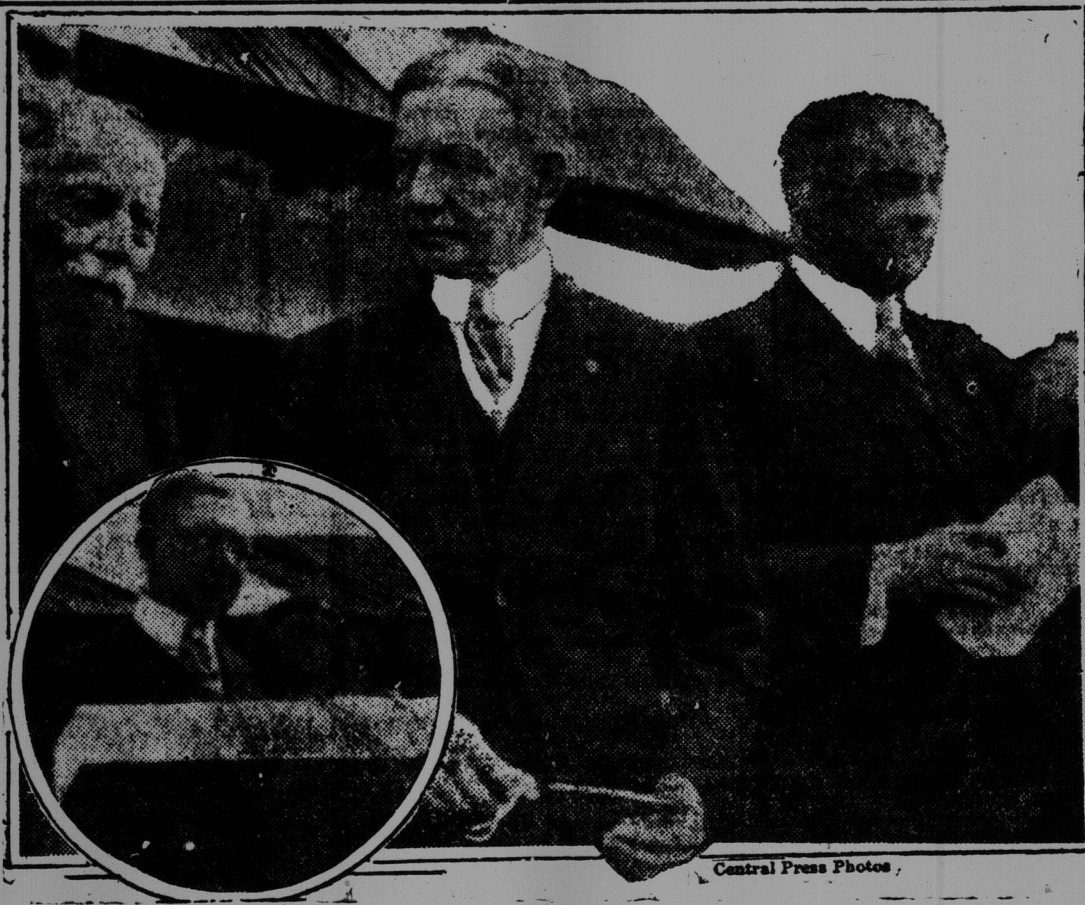

## CANADIAN VESSEL SEIZED IN PACIFIC

Crew of 15 on Alleged Rum Runner, With 1,000 Cases Whiskey, Held

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 7.—The capture of an alleged Canadian rum running steamer off the Colorado Islands Friday night, while the vessel was attempting to land 1,000 cases of whiskey, ostensibly for smuggling by fishing boats into San Diego, has been reported by the local Mexican Fish Commission by the commanding officer of the Mexican patrol steamer Tecate.

The vessel, the Tecate reported, was towed to Escondido, Mexico, the crew of 15 placed in custody, and the whiskey confiscated by the United States customs authorities.

Much interest is being manifested in what action the Canadian government may take regarding the seizure, which is expected by American and Mexican officials to have considerable effect in putting an end to the liquor traffic between British Columbia and Lower California. The authorities assert that the capture was made because the vessel was violating customs laws by smuggling the liquor ashore.

## COMMANDER OF BIG SHIP AT AGE OF 28

Capt. McKenna, Nephew of Moncton Woman, Goes to Canadian Volunteer

MONCTON, June 7.—Word has been received here of the appointment of Capt. P. A. McKenna, an officer in the service of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, to the command of the steamship Canadian Volunteer.

Captain McKenna is only 28 years of age and is a son of John McKenna of Charlottetown. Mrs. Thomas McAllister of Moncton is an aunt.

Captain McKenna has had a wide and successful career in the sea, and his rise from an able-bodied seaman to the high office of ship commander has been steady.

He began his sea career on the Northumberland, between Sumner and Point du Chene in 1912. After serving a season on this boat, he transferred to the steamship Halifax running between Charlottetown and Boston. That was in 1913. In 1914 he shipped on the steamship Evangeline.

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## BANK TELLER HANGS HIMSELF IN VAULT

Toronto Youth, Thirty-three Cents Short on Books, Commits Suicide

TORONTO, Ont., June 7.—Ivan Cowan, 19-year-old bank teller, committed suicide here yesterday by hanging himself in the vault of the institution, where he was employed.

Throwing a rope knotted around his neck, over an electric light hook, the youth stepped off a chair and cracked the bone of his neck. No inquest is to be held.

According to information supplied by officials of the bank, it would appear Cowan took his life because he was thirty-three cents short in the balancing of his ledger. The youth is known to have been kept to an exceptionally high nerve strain, and it is thought the continuous haggling with his ledger figures, rendered him temporarily unbalanced in mind.

## Ottawa Experiences Earthquake Shock

OTTAWA, Ont., June 7.—A severe earthquake shock was registered at the Dominion Observatory on Saturday. The first preliminary tremors arrived at 2:58.44 p.m., Eastern Standard time. The distance of the epicentre was 1,800 miles.

## Nobile Plans Voyage For Arctic Land

NEW YORK, June 7.—Friends of Colonel Nobile, who plotted the Amundsen-Ellsworth dirigible across the North Pole from Europe to Alaska, expressed a belief here today that he would organize an expedition to hunt for land in the Arctic wastes north of Alaska. Although those aboard the Norge failed to sight any land in the Arctic, Nobile said that he believed such a quest.

A public reception and dance was given by Nobile Roman Catholics here Saturday night in honor of Nobile and other Italians of the Norge crew. An Eskimo orchestra furnished the music.

## DECEIVED WIFE IS AWARDED BIG SUM

She Charges Father-in-Law With Counseling His Son's Defects

NEW YORK, June 7.—A jury before Supreme Court Justice Black returned a verdict for \$10,000 recently in favor of Mrs. May Gordon Abraham in a suit against her father-in-law, Max Abraham, for \$100,000.

She alleged that prior to her marriage to Abraham's son, Leon, on Sept. 29, 1921, he made false representations as to his son's mental and physical condition. She said she had asked the defendant, after she had received anonymous letters concerning her intended husband, whether they were true, and testified that the defendant told her that the letters were sent out of spite and that she had nothing to worry about.

After her marriage she said she found that her husband was a kleptomaniac and had other defects which she alleged were known to the defendant. Justice Black reserved decision on an application to set aside the verdict.

## RUM RUNNER BURNS; GUARDS NEAR DEATH

Four Arrested as Boat With Cargo Seized on Lake Ontario

YOUNGSTOWN, N. Y., June 7.—The launch, The Spruce, an alleged rum runner, was burned to the water's edge on Lake Ontario yesterday and George H. Cochrane, president of this village, who is also deputy sheriff, and Captain George Ferguson, in charge of the lighthouse at Port Niagara, who were on board, barely escaped with their lives.

The Spruce was captured on the shore between Youngstown and Wilson, while a group of alleged smugglers were loading it with contraband destined for Canada. Four members of the crew were arrested and charged with the crime.

The launch was worth about \$10,000 and it is estimated that it carried 400 gallons of alcohol valued at \$4,000. The four men arrested were: L. C. Smith, 30, of Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont., alleged skipper of the launch; Leonard Adams, 30, formerly of Leroy, N. Y., now in the Niagara-on-the-Lake; Robert White and Wm. Henderson, Niagara Falls.

## Doctors Held For Gland Operation

NEW YORK, June 7.—Two doctors who performed a gland operation on a five-year-old girl died when they learned their patient had died under the knife, police and members of the child's family charged. Arraigned in court Sunday for manslaughter, the physicians, Dr. Morris J. Josell and Dr. David Vintio, pleaded not guilty and were each held in \$10,000 bail to await examination in the homicide court Friday.

The doctors claimed they tried for 15 minutes to revive Frieda Cohen, upon whom they had performed the unsuccessful operation at her home.

## Asks Information Re British Concessions

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The House resolution requesting information from the State and War Departments, regarding British concessions in the Republic of Panama, was adopted Saturday by the Senate without a record vote.

The resolution was based on reports that the intention of those holding the concessions was to produce rubber. A copy of the concession is in possession of the State Department, which has seen nothing in it warranting diplomatic representations.

## Boston Hoping For Warmer Weather

BOSTON, Mass., June 7.—Boston looked hopefully for a predicted change in weather after the coldest June 6 in 41 years, with a minimum temperature of 48 degrees and a maximum of 52.

A year ago, the maximum was 100 degrees. At Eastport, Maine, the mercury dropped to the 46 mark Sunday.

## 300 INDIANS IN SIBERIA DIE OF STARVATION

Survivors Eat Comrades, Relatives and Animals

### DEPEND ON GUNS

Soviet Takes Away Firearms From Natives; Cut Off Food Supply.

NOME, Alaska, June 7.—Three hundred natives at Indian Point, Siberia, across Bering Straits from Alaska, died from starvation last winter, and those who survived ate their comrades, relatives and dogs, Captain Ira Rank, of the motorship Trader, reported here yesterday after a trading cruise to islands in the Bering Sea. The vessel arrived on Friday.

He declared that the natives on the Siberian coast must depend entirely upon ammunition and guns to provide their necessities for life, and that these were taken from them by the Soviets who forced an uprising.

Capital Rank said that the Soviets will not permit any one to trade or take ammunition or guns into the country.

News of the deaths was brought to Nome by a Russian school teacher of Whalen, who crossed the frozen region from East Cape, Siberia, for medicine for Russian officials who were ill.

At a lecture, Dr. Schumacher showed lantern slides of microbes which, he stated, were specimens of the cancer germ. They were made visible by a new method of coloring, and showed up on the screen as blue S-shaped organisms, with bulbs at each end.

The investigator declared that they are vegetable microbes, and that they are found in all cases of cancer. He believes that they are introduced into the human body as a result of eating raw vegetables and fruit, and holds that this is a cause of disorders of the digestive and kindred organs.

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## STORM WARNING

Washington Bureau Sends Out Word of Blow From Southwest

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—The Weather Bureau last night issued the following storm warning: Advisory, 10 p. m., southwest storm warnings ordered Atlantic coast, Boston to Sandy Hook. Disturbance south of Nantucket will move north-northeastward and cause fresh to strong northeast winds, which will shift to southwest late tonight (Sunday) or Monday morning, becoming strong on Monday.

## ST. KITTS PASTOR DIES

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., June 6.—Rev. George Hutchinson-Smith, D. D., pastor of Knox Presbyterian church in this city for 27 years, died at his home here this morning at the age of 62 years after an illness of many months.

He resigned as pastor of the local church while in the hospital last January and was placed on retiring allowance.

## Rectifies \$1 Error Made 63 Years Ago

BURLINGTON, Wis., June 7.—A 63-year-old mistake in change has just been rectified here. Back in 1863 John Richardson, a clerk in a dry goods store, gave Noel Hiscornette \$1 too much in change.

Riscornette, remembering the error in his old age, wrote from his home in Escanaba, Mich., to the Jericho postmaster for the heirs of Lucian Howe, the storekeeper. Through F. B. Howe the heirs were traced, and yesterday the dollar was paid.
