

# PROVIDENCE IS ANXIOUS OVER C.N.R. MATTER

Commissioner Bullock Brings Home Word of Rhode Island's Concern

ATTENDED PORT MEET IN NEW YORK

U. S. Coast Cities Sending Scout West to Drum Up Business

Commissioner T. H. Bullock, of the city harbor department, arrived home from New York today, where he had been attending a convention of the American Port Association. While nothing immediately pertaining to the Port of Saint John was introduced, he said he had numerous private conferences and casual conversations with officials and delegates from other ports.

U. S. MAYOR ANXIOUS

The commissioner's most notable interview was with the Mayor of Providence, R. I. He enquired of the Saint John delegate what he knew about the C. N. R.'s intentions concerning the Rhode Island port. The Canadian government had for years held interests in the state and had gone so far as to acquire private rights for the extension of its line to the coast waters at Portland, Maine, but so far no definite move had been made to run Canadian trains into that territory.

NO HOPE

The Mayor of Providence confessed to Commissioner Bullock that he was beginning to believe that his case was a hopeless one, an opinion which Commissioner Bullock briefly outlined to the Providence Mayor how strenuously the Ports of Saint John and Halifax were fighting their claims for business upon Canadian government transportation lines, both on land and sea.

THORNTON'S SUGGESTION

The Mayor of Providence said he was sensing this condition more every day and two recent interviews with Sir Henry Thornton were not only barren of promises, but the C. N. R. general manager suggested about the only way to cover up the Canadian government's obligations in land damages, etc. in the Rhode Island territory would be to put a mortgage on their holdings there and pay them off. To the people of Rhode Island this looked like the grand finale of Canadian government railways operation in that State. They were greatly disappointed.

MONTREAL HUSTLER

Commissioner Bullock said that during the big conference Port Official Fenell of Montreal was tendered a complimentary dinner by some grain shipping interests and before the party rose from the tables the energetic Montrealer had secured storage and shipping pledges to the extent of 40,000,000 bushels. This was possible because Montreal had the storage facilities and could switch its cargoes about with ease and despatch. To the Saint John commissioner this emphasized once more the value of ample accommodation.

YANKEES WIDE AWAKE

Oswego, N. Y., on Lake Ontario, was looming up as a contender for grain shipping business and at the gathering Commissioner Bullock discerned how coastwise and lake-wide American ports were keenly awake to this important branch of the transportation industry. He learned that within the last year Portland, Maine had sent out scores of freight scouts throughout the U. S. and Canadian west seeking business for outlet at that point. The new State Pier in Portland was one of the rival city's newest and best assets and its people were making considerable ado about it.

NEW VIEWPOINTS

The net result of Commissioner Bullock's attendance at the meetings was new viewpoints on the shipping situation giving proper perspective to the picture in which Saint John holds its place. Discussions and deliberations were general in their results and did not particularize. Therefore Saint John's case did not get any special consideration. The commissioner said that the Portland delegates objected to the reduction in grain rates but nothing directly bearing upon the comparative merits of Saint John and Portland and other rival ports was said or done.
