YESTERDAY IN CITY CHURCHES

Mr. Robbins also presented Miss M. E. Mullin, the organist a bouquet of flowers.

A new transoceanic record for the Pacific was set by the Canadian Pacific steamship Empress of Canada, which arrived in Victoria from the Orient yesterday. She made the voyage in eight days, ten hours and fifty-three minutes, considerably lowering the former record of eight days, sixteen hours and thirty-one minutes held by the Empress of Russia since 1914.

TAX RATE THREE CENTS HIGHER

The chairman of the Board of Assessors has announced that this year's tax rate will be 3c. Last year it was 2c. The announcement will be received with pleasure, as it was feared that the rate would be considerably higher. Mayor Fisher congratulated the members of the board for their work under existing conditions.
Features of the assessment details include a decrease of two cents for county purposes over last year and no increase for city purposes; an increase of \$6,550 in the levy; a decrease of \$1,800,000 in the real estate valuation; a decrease of 130 in the number of ratepayers.
The portion of the rate for city purposes is eight cents compared with seventy-eight cents for 1922.

U. S. CUSTOMS RECORD.
New York, June 18.—The U. S. Treasury will collect approximately \$550,000,000 in customs receipts this summer largely as a result of the shortage of farm hands, the Bureau of Employment reported. The report showed that in fifty-five of the sixty-seven counties in the State there are more than 9,000 vacant farms.
St. Paul, June 17.—(Associated Press)—Fourteen men, all prominent in the affairs of Minnesota, are running in primaries here tomorrow to succeed the late Frank B. Kellogg as members of the United States Senate. There are nine Republicans, three men of the Farmer-Labor party, and two Democrats. The regular election will be held next month.
