POSTAL EMPLOYEES NOW ALL UNITED

The Canadian Federation Now Has a Strength of 22,000 Members.

By the uniting of all branches of the postal service under the name of the Canadian Federation of Postal Employees, with a strength of 22,000 members, postal men have succeeded in uniting their demands for future representation to the Government and Civil Service Commission. Already they are contemplating presenting a memorial embodying suggestions which will vitally affect the service. This federation was the outcome of an all-work conference of the following organizations: the Dominion Postal Clerks' Association, the Dominion Railway Mail Clerks' Federation, the Federated Association of Letter Carriers, and the Amalgamated Postal Workers and Dominion Postal Porters' Association.

The convention took the view that the presentation of a request for salary increases under present conditions could not be conveniently received and decided upon by the government at the present time. Consequently no material increase is requested.

Part of the remuneration of a civil servant is in the form of a bonus, which is intended to supplement the salary schedule to the extent of meeting the abnormal cost of living. That bonus, it is held by the federation, has, at the best, been entirely inadequate to meet that abnormal increase in cost. Last year the government removed twenty-five per cent of the bonus and the remainder amounted to what a study of statistics indicates as insufficient to meet the bare necessities, but consideration of the circumstances above mentioned make it appear only reasonable that nothing further be asked than a permanency to the present schedule be established.

The next meeting of the convention will take place in Winnipeg early in the new year.

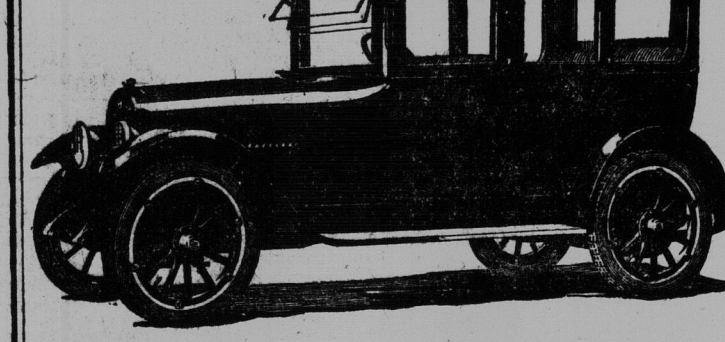

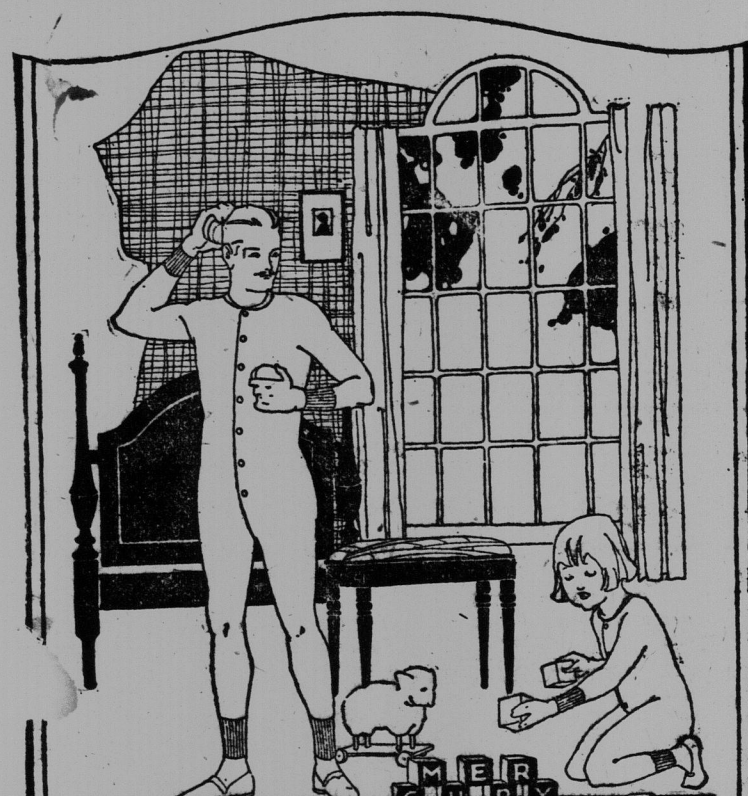
