LINER INSTALLS MOVIES

New Safety Film Will be Used on Passenger Ship.

The Martha Washington of the

Martha Washington of the Munson Line, which left New York bound for Buenos Aires, Montevideo and other South American ports will show motion pictures as part of the entertainment afforded her passengers. Other ships are expected to soon follow in the wake of the Martha Washington, and eventually, it is thought, the use of motion pictures for the entertainment of passengers at sea will be considered no more of a novelty than on Broadway. Showing films on board ship has been made possible by the use of a glow-burning film. Motion pictures on passenger ships have heretofore been barred because of the fire risk.

Slow-burning film has been approved

as without hazard and for unrestricted use or transportation by the Bureau of Explosives of the United States and Canada; the Parcel Post Department of the United States; Bureau of Fire Prevention, City of New York; Fire Department, City of New York; and by all express companies for transportation without restriction. It is planned to work up a program in co-operation with the heads of organizations, such as New York Community Service, American Legion, Knights of Columbus and the League of Foreign Born Citizens for the utilization of the mercantile film service in the interest of Americanization.

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CONDITIONS ARE SOUND

Some encouragement for the immediate financial and business outlook in Canada is given by the Monthly Letter of the Royal Bank of Canada for November. In addition to reviewing the conditions in the different provinces, the letter offers some general comment from which the following is taken:

"A point of adjustment such as that which most industries are now facing is always one of peculiar difficulty. A fortunate characteristic of the Canadian market is its tendency to move more liberally than that of the United States thereby giving Canadian industries more time and opportunity to prepare themselves for altered conditions. Basically, Canada's commercial position is a sound one and general business is far from being bad. Wholesale and retail trade conditions are less favorable than they were at this date last year, but the good, especially in the West. This is a logical development of the general uncertainty as to next year's price level. Taking Canada as a whole, the industries in which special dullness is reported are clothing and boots and shoes. Hardware is the only trade in which increased prices are reported. The labor situation throughout the Dominion appears for the most part, to be very much improved. Reports show that labor is more efficient, and that the men are more anxious to hold their positions than they have been at any time since armistice. Some unemployment is still to be seen, especially in the Prairie Provinces after the harvesting."

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TO ESTABLISH AN AIR STATION HERE

Captain L. E. Stevens of the Eastern Canada Air Lines Ltd. was in the city yesterday for the purpose of seeing Mayor Schofield and R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the board of trade, to arrange with them for an aerodrome site and to enlist the support of the common council and board of trade in regard to his company's proposed aerial mail service. Captain Stevens said that his company had submitted a proposal to the board of trade to hold a competition for the distribution of overseas mail to other parts of Canada and to the United States. He said that a subsidiary had been arranged by his company with the Dominion Government and he spoke with enthusiasm of the coming development of commercial flying of this character.

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for the week ended Nov. 4, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:

Cancellations are asked for in some lines, but about the only chance of having a cancellation recognized is when shipment has been delayed so long that it has become unreasonable. In that case consideration is often given. Otherwise requests for cancellation are receiving little sympathy. The trade holds that were they allowed, it would leave a lot of unsalable material on hand.

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
