Guarded His Game (London Times) What is believed to be an unprecedented end to a combat between a fox and a terrier is reported from the Blake Country.

A stout fox hunted by the Blencathra hounds for three and a half hours on the mountain heights above St. John's-in-the-Vale sought sanctuary in a fissure of rock in a crag near the skyline of Wanthwaite. Here he faced one of the gamest terriers belonging to the packs, and scrambling to a shelf in the rocks, was able for some time to give as fierce punishment as he got. The terrier kept the fox, but refused to leave it, and followers and hounds had at last to quit the crags so that they might make the descent of one of the most dangerous ravines of the mountain range before darkness. When hunters and whip returned next morning to the crags they found terrier as well as fox lying dead upon the bourn.

An examination of the terrier showed that the fox had inflicted no mortal wound upon him. The terrier had dragged the fox out and then, loth to leave it had laid down beside it. It was clear that he had died from exposure during a bitterly cold night. No similar case has, so far as is known, occurred before.

STORAGE OF ICE FOR SUMMER USE. The storage of a few blocks of ice for summer use is a very simple matter when the ice is properly stored. Any unoccupied corner of a shed will serve for the purpose. A rough board enclosure 10 feet square and eight feet high will hold enough ice to provide 50 pounds per day for 180 days, after allowing for a reasonable amount of wastage. The smaller the quantity stored, the larger is the proportion of waste.

The bottom of the enclosure should be covered with sawdust. If the soil underneath is impervious clay it will be all the better if there is a few inches of gravel under the sawdust. In the following year the dried ice taken away from one side and replaced after the ice is in position. A space of one foot should be left between the ice and the boards to be filled with sawdust, and the ice should be covered with about the same thickness. It is the sawdust which keeps the ice from melting. The drier the sawdust the better the ice will keep, and it is a good plan, as the ice is removed during the summer, to throw out from time to time the dried ice from the sawdust where it will be under cover and continue to dry out and thus be in better condition to be used the following year. The ice should be cut in blocks of uniform size and packed as closely together as possible.

If it is necessary to erect a special ice house the roughest kind of a shed that will keep out the weather is all that is necessary. Poles may be driven into the ground and lined up on the inside with rough lumber, or slabs, leaving a space of about one-half inch between each board, and the whole covered with a roof of about one-half inch of sawdust. The same procedure should be followed in storing the ice and covering it with sawdust as advised in the preceding paragraph.

If sawdust cannot be obtained, planer mill shavings may be used for packing the ice, or in cases where neither is available hay may be used as a packing or covering material.

Marsh or "slough" hay or any fine wild hay which grows in low places gives the best results. If hay is used, the space around the ice or between the ice and the walls instead of being only one foot, should be two feet, into which the hay must be well packed. The ice should also be covered with about two feet of the hay.
