MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Sir Herbert Ames started his war saving campaign in Halifax yesterday by speeches at the Rotary Club and the Commercial Club.

The Quebec harbor police confiscated fifteen bottles of liquor yesterday. They were placed on guard to prevent the de- livery of liquor to returning soldiers in Quebec. In searching persons passing they took fourteen bottles from a ser- geant-major and one from a lieutenant.

The epidemic of fires in Halifax con- tinues. Yesterday morning one of the outbuildings of the city prison was burned down. Two cows, two cats, two calves, a valuable horse and the con- tents of the barn were burned.

The plebiscite for authority for the town of Newcastle applying to the provincial legislature for authority to is- sue \$150,000 bonds to develop water power carried almost unanimously.

The South African Mining Journal on gold industry says that a period of low gold output is probable. The paper strongly urges that all gold-using na- tions should contribute towards state subsidies to low grade mines in order to prevent the loss of twenty per cent of the output.

France's civilian population in four years has decreased considerably over three-quarters of a million without in- cluding the deaths in occupied northern France nor the losses due directly to the war. In 1919 the births outnumbered the deaths by 17,000; 1918 the deaths outnumbered the births by 50,000 and in 1915-1916 by nearly 300,000 each year.

OFFICER AND YOUNG LADY INJURED IN ACCIDENT.

A serious accident occurred at an early hour this morning at the corner of Co- burg and Carleton streets when an au- tomobile driven by Lieutenant Carr of the local military staff, collided with a telephone pole and then backed into a fence. In the car with Lieutenant Carr was Miss Irvine of 34 Wright street and another officer and lady, who were re- turning to their homes after attending the dance in the G. W. V. A. rooms. When the automobile was turning the corner something happened to the steer- ing gear and the accident occurred. Both Miss Irvine and Lieutenant Carr were quite seriously injured and were taken to the general public and military hos- pitals respectively.

James H. Frink, provincial fuel con- troller, has received word from C. A. Magrath of Ottawa that his work as director ceases on Feb. 11. This means that the price control ceased at the same date. There is now an ample sup- ply of anthracite coal in Canada and the United States.

Rev. W. D. Wilson gave a helpful ad- dress to the members of the W. C. T. U. in Orange hall yesterday. Mrs. David Hipwell was president and Mrs. R. D. Christie acted as secretary for the meet- ing.

Mrs. E. A. Smith and Mrs. W. F. B. Paterson, representatives of the Local Council of Women, asked Mayor Hayes yesterday that a site be furnished at the junction of Union and Bruns- wick streets for the purpose of erecting a drinking fountain for persons and ani- mals.

The police conciliation board, of which H. Colby Smith is chairman, held a brief session last evening at the board of trade rooms. P. C. Sharkey and George Mel- vin gave their views as to the right of the police to be affiliated with trade

HARBOR MASTER'S REPORT

annual report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1918, advises the city council that the practice adopted during the war of not allotting berths has proved most satisfactory and he strongly recom- mends the continuation of the open berth sys- tem.

He reported that he found that silt was settling in some of the berths, and he drew attention to the dispute between the city and the marine and fisheries de- partment regarding No. 14 berth, the city being entitled, he thought, to one-quarter of side and top wharfage.

During the year a total of 214 steamers, forty-three schooners and two barks ar- rived and cleared for overseas.

Overseas tonnage amounted to \$49,299; coasting tonnage amounted to 170,168; the revenue from top wharfage was \$84,699.78; the revenue from top wharf- age was \$89,680.14; anchorage fees were \$3,938.75; harbor master's fees were \$7,062.50; total, \$145,406.12.
