Paris, May 7.—The French boxing federation, the principal authority in ring contest in France, which for a time refused to recognize Jack Johnson as the heavyweight champion boxer of the world, has accepted his claim to the title.

The general management of the bout between Johnson and Frank Moran of Pittsburgh, which will take place June 27, has been assumed by Theodore Vienne of the boxing federation. The plans for the Velodrome d'Hiver, where the bout will be held, provided 26,000 seats and standing room for 4000.
