SAYS THAT SOME REAL ESTATE MEN INQUIRE CANADA

Henry Vivian, Co-partnership Man, Takes Home Some Opinions After Visit to Dominion

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, Oct. 25.—In the opinion of Henry Vivian, founder of the co-partnership movement, who returned from Canada last week, a short decline in the price of real estate in Canada was inevitable. Land values, he believes, are far too high, and the real estate man too much in evidence. All the capital Canada could get could be used in the development of its industries and railways; it was a thousand pities therefore, that so much was taken up in land gambling.

This was weak water beside the strong meat which was served up by newspapers here, and Canadian circles are greatly concerned at the loss of Canadian prestige brought about by the sale in London of real estate men here; or to over-emphasize the necessity of a change in this direction. People in Canada can have no conception of the condition arising from the actions of these selling real estate men. Great Britain at immensely inflated prices or measures to curtail them would immediately be taken. The passport to Canadian land is a lot factor; and a heavy score is being laid upon which will have to be settled at no distant date.

This opinion can be confirmed in responsible Canadian circles in London. In the investment advice columns of newspapers it is frequently advised that extreme caution should be used in purchasing Canadian land. An inquiry was made into the value of lots outside a small town in Alberta, which were being offered and sold here extensively at \$175, and it was ascertained that a mile nearer the town lots could be purchased for \$75 to \$70. The question Canadian land in London is asking is as to whether the good name of genuine concerns should be sacrificed by the operations of the unscrupulous, and it demands a prompt answer; and nowhere will you find it more insisted upon than in Canadian circles in close touch with the money market here.

With the growth in Canada of the co-partnership housing movement, Mr. Vivian is much gratified. He doubts if there is a town in the dominion where, if an inquiry was made at the city hall about housing the movement would not be mentioned. That was largely due to the fact that Canada's governor-general—Earl Grey and the Duke of Cornwall—were enthusiasts on the subject. Speaking with Canadian towns, the character of the dwellings and the system of sanitation, he said there was no corporate view of life here and even in cities admirably placed, the drainage and water supply were still very deficient.

SAYS ENGLAND HAS TOO BIG POPULATION

London, Oct. 25.—Principal Lloyd of Saskatoon, who is in London, declares that England has ten million more inhabitants than she can properly support, and that this over-pressure of population is at the root of three-fourths of the trouble and unrest in this country at the present time. He hopes that the problem will be dealt with ere long in a statesmanlike way.

BUNCH OF KEYS TONIGHT AT THE OPERA HOUSE

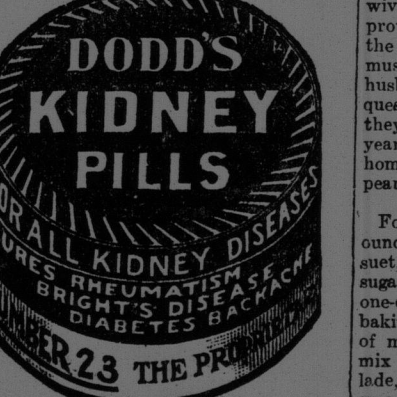
