life have provoked thousands of blood-curdling tales, particularly relating to the white man's struggle against the Redskins in the pioneering days, told The Free Press something about himself last night that is not generally known.

The Colonel's father was a native of Oxford County and for many years lived on the Cody homestead near Embro in the County of Oxford, not far from Woodstock.

He, too, was filled with the lust for strife, apparently, for it is recorded as a matter of authentic history that the father of the famous "Buffalo Bill" was the first man to give his life for slave emancipation in the "Bleeding Kansas Wars" of 1856.

Isaac Cody—that was his name—lived with his wife, who was an Englishwoman, on their Oxford County farm, in the neighborhood of which many families of Codies are at present situated. The winters did not appeal to him, however, and he concluded to seek his fortune in the State of Kansas.

A few years after his arrival there an effort was made to extend slavery into the Northwestern States, and Isaac Cody was among the first to raise his protest. An opposition party was organized, and within a short time "The Bleeding Kansas Wars" were being waged.

First Man to Fall
"My father was the first man to fall in those wars," Col. Cody told a Free Press reporter, "and I was then but nine years of age. There are many Codies in this part of the country, and I think I can claim relationship with the majority of them."
