

Isaac Cody—that was his name—lived with his wife, who was an Englishwoman, on their Oxford County farm, in the neighborhood of which many families of Codys are at present situated. The winters did not appeal to lim, however, and he concluded to seek his fortune in the State of Kansas.

A few years after his arrival there an effort was made to extend slavery into the Northwestern States, and Isaac Cody was among the first to raise his protest. An opposition party was organized, and within a short time "The Bleeding Kansas Wars" wete being waged.
