SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dom-
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and Alberta, excepting 3 and 4, is
not reserved, may be homesteaded by
any person who is the head of a
family, or any male over 18 years of
age, to the extent of one-quarter
section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at
the local land office for the district in
which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to per-
form the conditions connected therewith,
under one of the following plans:

Six months' notice in writing should
be given to the Commissioner of
Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention
to apply for patent of the land.

NO PARTICULAR HURRY.

It is difficult to understand why such
undue haste should be exhibited in
the part of those who favor the intro-
duction of the ward system. Judging
from the strenuous efforts which are
being put forth, the whole future of
the city depends upon the immediate
passage of the bill, and if it should be
held up for a year a dreadful calamity
might happen. We have got along
very well during the past thirteen or
fourteen years under the present sys-
tem; the evils, concerning which com-
plaints are heard, are by no means as
serious as those existing when the last
change was made; and in another year
the city could not suffer so very much
whether, on a plebiscite, a majority of
St. John electors would favor the
introduction of the ward system. The
citizens who speak in this way are
few in numbers compared with those
who are satisfied to have matters re-
main as they are. No one would ever
have imagined there was anything
wrong with the present system were it
not for the declarations of one or
two aldermen who have discovered the
existence of rings or cliques. However
the main object at present is to find
the opinion of the electorate, and then
pass a bill which meets the views of
the people. It would be simply out-
rageous to force on St. John any more
aldermen than are now elected for the
board is already too large and if a
change is to be made it should be a
reduction.

SOME OF THOSE WHO NOW URGE THE

The new premier is a follower of
Stambouloff. He is highly esteemed by
the people, the press speaks favorably
of him and he possesses the confidence
of a majority of the members of the
national assembly. He will continue
the policy of the late M. Petkoff.

CARNEGIE MEDALS
DISTRIBUTED TODAY

PITTSBURGH, Pa., March 17.—The
first distribution of hero medals will
be made tomorrow by the Carnegie
Hero Fund Commission. Gold, silver
and bronze medals will be given to
sixty-three persons, in different parts
of the United States and Canada. At
the last meeting of the commission
Jan. 16, eight other medals were
awarded but these will be distributed
later.

because the commission was not sat-
isfied with the designs submitted.

NEW YORK, March 17.—Arthur
Preston Green and Charles Rohrer, pas-
sengers on the North German Lloyd
steamer Amerika, were arrested when
the vessel arrived from Hamburg and
Southampton today charged with at-
tempted smuggling. Diamonds and
jewelry to the appraised value of nearly
\$25,000, which the custom officials
alleged the prisoners had failed to de-
clare, was taken from them. The valu-
ables were confiscated and the men
were held for extradition.

Thoroughly in the charge of smuggling
was preferred against the prisoners
here, they are wanted abroad in con-
nection with a theft of some \$35,000
worth of jewelry and precious stones,
and the London authorities have been
notified. On Wednesday the local po-
lice received a cablegram from Scotland
Yard asking that they be detained upon
their arrival.

Police detectives accompanied the
treasury officials to Quarantine and
made the arrests after the men had
declared that they had no dutiable
belongings. The prisoners had been in-
structed to look for accomplices and
temporarily detained two women pas-
sengers who were pointed out by
Halling, been seen in conversation
with Green and Rohrer during the
trip. An examination of the baggage
of these women and men revealed an
attempt to connect them with an attempt
at smuggling and when they were
taken to police headquarters they con-
vinced the inspector that their knowl-
edge of the prisoners was limited to a
casual acquaintance on shipboard.

Green described himself as a salesman,
31 years of age, with a home in this
city. The police allege that he has re-
peatedly been arrested for shoplifting
and has served three years' imprison-
ment in Wisconsin.

Rohrer gave the same age and occupa-
tion, but said that Philadelphia was
his home. According to the police he
has a record including arrests in Phil-
adelphia and Atlantic City.

Two Moncton young men who accom-
panied the Victoria hockey team to
Halifax had a narrow escape from be-
ing burned to death in the Queen Hotel,
Halifax, Friday night. About two
hours after they retired one of the
young men was awakened by feeling
his hand burning. When sufficiently
awake to realize the trouble he found
the bed on fire and the room full of
suffocating smoke. He tried to arouse
his companion but he was unable to do
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rushed to the bathroom near by, where
the flames were suppressed. In the
act the young man's hand was badly
burned. The other occupant of the
room recovered from the effects of the
smoke when removed from the room.
About forty or fifty guests were on the
same floor of the hotel at the time and
an alarm had been given a panic
would have ensued.
